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Editorial

When the time comes around each year to remember those who gave their lives in the two World Wars, and in countless conflicts since, the poppy is, perhaps, the most widely understood symbol of our remembering. Our wearing of the poppy joins us, without words, to the millions of others who, later this month, will pause to look back, to remember and to be thankful.

Alongside this outward token of remembrance, the contemplation of poetry in the season of remembrance also plays a helpful role. The experience of the first world war poets is worth reflecting on 'lest we forget' and repeat the mistakes of the past which brought suffering and loss to so many millions of ordinary people.

One of the most celebrated World War I poets is Siegfried Sassoon. He was commissioned into the 3^{rd} Battalion (Special Reserve), Royal Welch Fusiliers, as a second lieutenant on 29^{th} May 1915. Sassoon's periods of duty on the Western Front were marked by exceptionally brave actions, including the single-handed capture of a German trench. Sassoon's bravery was so inspiring that soldiers of his company said that they felt confident only when he accompanied them.

However, Sassoon became horrified by the realities of war, and the tone of his writing changed completely, to convey the ugly truths of the trenches to an audience which, previously, knew nothing of this.

One of his most celebrated poems was written in April 1919, shortly after Sassoon had taken up the position of Literary Editor of the Daily Herald, where he hoped for a fresh start, having just left the army.

Everyone Sang, by Siegfried Sassoon

Everyone suddenly burst out singing; And I was filled with such delight As prisoned birds must find in freedom, Winging wildly across the white Orchards and dark-green fields; on - on - and out of sight.

Everyone's voice was suddenly lifted; And beauty came like the setting sun: My heart was shaken with tears; and horror Drifted away ... O, but Everyone Was a bird; and the song was wordless; the singing will never be done.

The speaker in the poem hears everyone around suddenly burst into song, and the sound of singing fills him with delight. There's a suggestion that this delight is related to a feeling of relief and, indeed, release; he likens it to the feeling that a caged bird must feel when it is freed and allowed to fly away.

The song being sung is 'wordless', like birdsong. Perhaps the poet wants us to imagine the sound of singing birds as nature's reminder that the world goes on as ever, despite the sacrifices being made by thousands in war.

It is possible that Sassoon didn't have the Armistice in mind when he wrote 'Everyone Sang', but rather soldiers singing in the trenches. The poem, then, is perhaps not about joy that the

war is over but rather a temporary and spontaneous desire to sing as a way of keeping one's spirits up during a time of death, warfare, and uncertainty. However, later on in his life, Sassoon talked about the poem as 'an expression of release'.

Whether it was intended to be interpreted as such or not, 'Everyone Sang' struck a chord with readers after the end of the First World War, because it seemed to capture the mood of exhilarating release felt by everyone following the Armistice. So at least in the minds of its many readers, and possibly in the intentions of its author, this is a poem of peace rather than war.

In the Bible reading used on Remembrance Sunday, Jesus says: *Blessed are the peacemakers*, *they will be called God's children*. These 'peacemakers' of whom Jesus speaks are those who can show their fellow human beings how to cooperate instead of competing or fighting; those who are willing to forgo the struggle to be right or first in order that all may have their voice heard and their needs met; those who will turn their anger into prayer and their prejudices into penitence.

They are those who are willing to let go of argument and accusation and to have the courage to sing a song of healing. If the song is loud enough to share, its truth touches all things, enabling all beings to join their voices in song, whose singing will never be done.

May our remembering lead us to gratitude and hope.

Eve and the Origins of Womanhood

On the 25th September, the Women's Theology Groups hosted an event for men and women to attend. The evening was a huge success, with more than fifty people coming together to study the Hebrew text of Genesis 1-3 in depth. The men who volunteered to provide refreshments outdid themselves: we enjoyed a selection of pastries and cakes, as well as the usual tea and coffee, and we were really grateful to all who helped set up and tidy up at the end.

Why do we have Women's Theology Groups?

The Bible has many difficult topics within it, including many stories of violence towards women. We meet together to discuss these subjects in as safe a space as possible – people don't have to talk about their own experiences, but it gives more of an opportunity for support. Biblical passages with any kind of violence towards women are not found in the Sunday lectionary so they would be unlikely to ever be properly discussed without these groups.

Why study women from the Bible separately?

In the groups we approach the text with a particular purpose, paying special attention to the woman or women in the story. Women we have covered this year include: Sarah, Hagar, Rebekah, Rachel, Leah, Bilhah, Zilpah, Delilah, Deborah, Jael, Ruth, Naomi, Orpah, Esther, Mary, Elizabeth, Junia, the women at the tomb, the woman at the well and the Syro-Phoenician woman.



Why is Eve important?

For many Christians, the beginning of Genesis can be a difficult read. Within our churches there may be a range of opinions about what it really means, whether the creation narratives are true in an historical sense, and whether Adam and Eve were real people. Regardless of this, Eve remains an important figure for women, whether or not she truly existed. This story has caused women to be seen as more sinful than men, less important than men (as if created as a second thought), and weaker than men. With this in mind, we looked closely at the language used in our translations of the text of Genesis. For example, we looked at the word *adam*, often translated as 'man' or 'humankind', which is more accurately translated as 'earth creature', when understood in the poetic language of Genesis, since *adamah* means earth.

Worship Notes November 2019

The Feast of All Saints, on 1st November, marks the beginning of what has come to be informally named the Kingdom Season. The four Sundays which make up the season are a continuation of 'ordinary time' and used to be part of a series of nine Sundays before Advent. The Church's year draws to its close with the Feast of Christ the King. The liturgical colour for the season is red or green.

Friday 1st November - All Saints' Day

All Saints' Day celebrates men and women in whose lives the Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is a time to be encouraged by the example of the saints and to recall that holiness can grow in the ordinary circumstances of human life, as well as in the extraordinary events.

Saturday 2nd November - All Souls' Day

10.30am: Requiem Eucharist at St Alphege. Also known as The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed, this day celebrates the saints in a more local and intimate way. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more directly: those who gave us life, or who nurtured us in faith.

Sunday 3rd November

6.30pm: New Door Memorial Service at St Alphege at which those whom we have known personally who have died will be remembered.

Wednesday 6th November

10am: Eucharist at St Michael's Chapel at which we will commemorate the life of St Leonard, a 6th-century hermit who is the Patron saint of prisoners and to whom over a hundred and seventy English churches are dedicated.

Friday 8th November

4pm at St Helen's Church: Messy Church, a fun worship event for families with songs, stories and activities to help us to learn more about following Jesus – followed by a cooked tea!

Sunday 10th November - Remembrance Sunday

Today across our parish we explore the theme of memory, both corporate and individual, as we confront issues of war and peace, loss and sacrifice. The 11am service at St Alphege will be the Civic observance beginning at the War Memorial.

At 6.30pm at St Helen's Church, there is a memorial service to remember those whom we have loved and lost.

Sunday 17th November

4pm at St Helen's Church: Jigsaw, a service for all ages with songs, prayers and opportunities to explore the Bible through a wide range of activities – followed by Sunday tea!

Sunday 24th November - Christ the King





December 1st

I don't know about you, but I have often noticed that the simple things of this world work better for me. For instance, I drink black coffee and black tea; I like to wake up without the alarm clock; I love to walk, especially long distances; or to curl up on a rainy day with a good book. I could go on, but hopefully you get the picture? However, experience has taught me that we can underestimate the power of the simple things in this life.

Looking ahead in the Church calendar towards Advent, amongst the melee that is preparing for Christmas these days, like many other Christians I try to use Advent as a time to bring me closer to God: at home our book shelves are full of Advent reading books – so many that I sometimes feel that I have 'done Advent to death'. Imagine my delight then, when I saw the following on Facebook.

NEW CHRISTMAS TRADITION

Beginning December 1st,
Read one chapter of
The Book of Luke in the Bible
each evening.
There are 24 chapters.
On Christmas Eve you will have read
an entire account of Jesus' life
and wake up Christmas Morning

Of course, no-one is saying that we can't have chocolate (or some other treat that takes our fancy) during Advent, but how many Advent calendars these days focus on the Christmas story? Not many – believe me, I've looked. And, although I don't usually like time of day to do things being prescribed – we are all unique with different pulls on our time – I personally do like the idea of making a time each evening to read this wonderful story. I can imagine myself curled up with a cup of hot chocolate, immersing myself afresh in what can often feel like an over-familiar Christmas narrative.

It's a simple thing – the best things often are - but it could help both us and/or someone else take their relationship with Jesus to a whole other level:



The picture is a representation of a Georgian Christmastide from an original watercolour by Roger Heath.

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



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Remembrance Sunday

or the past five years, we have been marking centenary anniversaries of particular historical events concerning the First World War.

1919 marks the creation of the League of Nations. Following the conclusion of hostilities at the end of the First World War, the warring factions met at the Palace of Versailles near Paris in 1919 to formally end the war. A confirmed isolationist at the beginning of the war, President Woodrow Wilson had by now become an ardent champion of internationalism.

In 1918, President Woodrow Wilson had issued a 14-point statement which included the ending of secret alliances between countries; the open use of the seas; open trade between countries; a reduction of armaments; reviewing the needs of colonial peoples and the establishing of an international organisation which would be responsible for helping to keep peace among the nations. Guided by this 14-point statement, Wilson and his allies sought a lasting peace enforced by what he called the League of Nations, a



forerunner to the United Nations of today. Wilson made the League's establishment a priority of the Paris Peace Conference.

The Treaty of Versailles, signed on July 25, 1919, imposed strict penalties on Germany and forced it to accept full responsibility for the starting the war. Germany was not only forced to demilitarize but also cede territory to France and Poland and pay billions in reparations. Similar penalties were also imposed on Austria-Hungary in separate negotiations.

Ironically, the U.S. was not a member of the League of Nations; the US Senate rejected its participation. Instead, the U.S. embraced a policy of isolationism that would dominate foreign policy in the 1920s. The harsh penalties imposed on Germany, meanwhile, would later give rise to radical political movements in that nation, including Adolf Hitler's Nazi Party.

The League of Nations ceased its activities after failing to prevent the Second World War and the United Nations came into being during and after the Second World War. Although the League of Nations ultimately proved to lack the "teeth" required to stop the Second World War, it had laid the foundations underlining the need for nations to come together and set out charters and treaties to try to avoid/manage conflict.

Over the last couple of years Hilary really struggled with acute hearing loss which made communication difficult, but she still managed to attend services until very recently. She died following a fall and a period in hospital and respite care.

She was a great friend and committed Christian who will be greatly missed.

Matters of Faith

Glimpses of the Divine

My father had a long and richly varied pastoral ministry in the Church of England. He would often share some of his experiences with the family. He had a lively sense of humour and we looked forward to his anecdotes about some of the people he came across.

I am writing this on All Saints Day which is why I am particularly remembering how my father would from time to time describe someone he knew as "a real saint." Such people often turned out to be very ordinary and simple folk who had impressed my father by their unselfishness, their concern for others, their uncomplaining acceptance of difficulty or pain. Most of his stories I have long forgotten, but I do recall very vividly a telling phrase he once came up with after an encounter with such a "saint". He paused a moment in his narrative, and then he said: "You know, there are some people you just cannot account for unless God exists."

Those are words that are worth pondering over. I hope we have all had the experience of having met someone in that category. I certainly have, and feel as a result that I have had a real glimpse of the kingdom of God. Here are two of them.

Mrs Williams

It is a good many years now since I met Mrs Williams. She spent a large proportion of her life immobile in Little Bromwich Hospital where I was part-time chaplain. At that time her condition required her to be encased in an iron lung, a tube-like contraption rather like a miniature submarine which enabled her to breathe. In the course of visiting, I got to know Mrs Williams quite well. As there was no chapel in the hospital at that time, she agreed that I could celebrate the Holy Communion alongside this iron lung before taking the Sacrament round to those patients who had requested it. It was the ideal place, simply because, although she had no formal Church connection, there was an indefinable holiness about Mrs Williams.

On one level, she seemed an entirely ordinary and unremarkable person. But I discovered that many of the more mobile patients, as well as members of the hospital staff, would go to chat with Mrs Williams when they were feeling fed up and depressed. "The place really gets me down sometimes," one nurse told me confidentially, "but when I get anxious and miserable I go and talk with Mrs Williams. She always cheers me up." I have to say that Mrs Williams had the same effect on me. My father would definitely have included her among his "real saints." A glimpse of the Divine!

Tracey

One other glimpse is worth sharing, again a hospital story from years ago but immovably fresh in the memory. It is a normal morning on the ward in the Children's Hospital, happily for once without any great traumas or emergencies having to be dealt with. The children are in their beds or cots, some quiet, some more boisterous and demanding. The doctors have done their rounds: the staff are about their regular duties.

Suddenly a small girl appears on the ward. She is about eight or nine and is clutching a fairly large bag. One of the nurses immediately recognises her. "Hullo Tracey! What are <u>you</u> doing here?" Tracey had been a patient on the ward a few weeks previously and she had been discharged as a matter of course when she was well enough to go home. I can't remember Tracey's response well enough to quote it: that doesn't matter. Sufficient to say that she told the nurse that, since she left the hospital, she had been saving up her pocket money and she had used it to buy presents for the other children. Whereupon she went round the ward with her bag, distributing small toys to each occupant of a bed or cot.

If that is not a glimpse of the Divine, I don't know what is! There are indeed some people you just cannot account for unless God exists.

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Matters of Faith

Love one another

"See that ye love one another with a pure heart fervently" [1 Peter 1.22]

I wonder how conscious we are of the presence of a recipient for the prayer we address to God; "No man has seen God at any time" [1 John 4.12], nor can ever do so. And He ought never to be a figment of the imagination. St John tells us that "God is a spirit" [John 4.24] whose presence can be felt.

St John thought "God is love" [1 John 4.8] "who dwelleth in us" [1 John 4.12], recognising a specific identity of God in that felt presence. As St Luke put it, "Neither shall they say; 'Lo here', or 'Lo there', for behold the kingdom of God is within you" [Luke17,12]. That is the reality of the situation in our praying. "I thought to have the sense of God present, to feel His hand in mine. If I cannot, of what use am I?" (as an ordained minister of the Church).

We can know, and have contact with, God through our feelings of the love which He has given to us.

"Shall I tell you what I would like?" she whispered, "To take God's hand and show Him things. I'm certain He's not seen everything".

"My dear, what things you say"

"But He hasn't, and it's time He did. We'd creep and peep, and see it all for once, as He can't in His Churches"

[quotation from Galsworthy's novel of 1917-18, "Saint's Progress"].

"Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another" [1 John 4.12]. Everyone who knows such love, knows God. "If we love one another, His love is perfected in us, because He hath given us His Spirit" as its source. Such love is not to be confused with human affection. It is without discrimination, personal and social inhibition, having an equal respect for everyone, for anyone, all worthy of equal attention, requiring transformation of human affection in full recognition of difference.

The crucial factor is that loving another affords that person a priority of care and concern, in the denial of love for one's self; which would be safe in the hands of everyone else, in their love for me. Perhaps the kind of love referred to here is more a matter of care and concern anyway.

But St Peter's words are not limited to the personal intention to do all that is required of us with love, in all circumstances, giving ourselves with love for the activity itself; for those with whom we become involved, without regard for any personal attachment. The activity St Peter describes involves other people in a social situation wherein it can happen. And what he teaches moves into the social, political and economic spheres of life.

Fundamentally it involves relations with others individually, but also in groups — in formal associations — which following the 'individual' take upon themselves, act 'individually' with other societies. However, those societies acting individually in St Peter's terms, form village, town, city communities, and in turn the village, town, city bring their 'individuality' into counties, and nation states, themselves acting 'individually' in the sphere of the United Nations.

In other words, at all levels between the person and the world state, there is that single, firm back-bone of love for one another from the individual through communities, industries,

cultural groupings, nations and the world state, committed to the preservation and peace of its very life and existence. What St Peter and St John expect from their teaching is the globalisation of its message.

Many of our politicians are respected and revered for their ready and direct involvement in matters of care and concern for their constituents, in both personal and communal matters.

Compare that with some of the actions of Government – e.g. (from T.LS., August 2^{nd} 2019): "Theresa May announced the intention to use the Immigration Act of 2014 to create a 'really hostile environment for illegal immigrants'. The 2016 Immigration Act further intensified that hostility, with its root-and-branch foreclosure on anything like a liveable life". Present life is overcrowded with this disparity not to warrant further reference.

The Church of England has raised its opposition to Wayne Rooney's recent investments. That is a miniscule intervention compared to the need of a united Religious stance on the whole social, political, and economic businesses of the peoples in the world's nations. Surely the scandal of the footballer's income in the society of homeless people sleeping on the streets of our cities, in increasing numbers, the expanding growth in Food Banks, should shame us all in the roots of our being?

There can be no solution to inter-nation conflict, no world peace, no end to the "sustained systematic and brutal assault on every aspect of the life of individual vulnerable people" until in the private, and public and corporate life of each one of us we "love one another with a pure heart, fervently'.


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
