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# Editorial

**2020** will be a year that we will all remember for ever, for many of us it may be a year we would prefer to forget. November is a month of remembrance. November 1<sup>st</sup> is All Saints Day when we remember the whole body of saints, November 2<sup>nd</sup> is All Souls' Day when we reflect on personal losses, the period of remembrance continues through to November 11<sup>th</sup> when we remember those who have died serving their country. On November 22<sup>nd</sup> we remember the most important thing of all. We remember Jesus is King: 'Christ the King'. This season of remembrance will be a particularly poignant time as we all search for comfort and hope during the continuing Covid-19 pandemic.

When we remember, we have in mind, or are able to bring to mind, an awareness of someone or something in the past:

- On All Saints Day we don't remember one particular saint, no one is lesser or greater. The diversity and variety of the saints is a source of encouragement to us all, there is a place for everyone, and indeed there is a special place for the lowly and humble.
- On All Souls Day we remember those we have been close to who have recently died or those whose memory we've been keeping down the years. As we remember, we become aware of our loss and our grief, but we remember too that God is with us in that loss and grief – to comfort and support us and to bring us hope.
- Fortunately few of us now have direct experience of war, so on Remembrance Sunday whilst we remember family members and others affected by war, we also bring to mind our own understanding of the horrors of war – the pain, bewilderment, anguish, bravery, heroism.

At the heart of our Christian faith is an act of remembrance. Whenever we celebrate the Eucharist we engage in an act of remembrance. When Jesus shared the Last Supper with his friends, he broke bread, said thank you to God for it and shared it with his friends saying, 'Take eat. This is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' Through this act of remembrance, we recognise our own frailty, we ask for forgiveness and we receive the gift of God's grace.

The feast of Christ the King marks the end of the Church's year and we look towards Advent and forward to our celebration of Christ's birth. It's the perfect time to review the year and to prepare for the year ahead.

In years to come when we recall the year 2020, let us hope that amongst the memories of loved ones who died, economic hardship, being deprived of human contact, missing spending time with friends and family, we are also able to remember the immense sacrifice made by key workers and the many acts of kindness that we heard about, saw or experienced.

Jesus calls us to serve him by serving each other, particularly those people who are most in need. Serving can be hard physical work, but it can also be about being attentive, watching

and waiting, considering another person's needs above all else. This kind of service is an expression of love. Just think how naturally we focus our attention on another person and their needs when we love them: new parents watch over their baby, attending to every smile and whimper, old friends seem to sense when we particularly need help or a shoulder to cry on.

During this season of remembrance let us remember that Jesus served us when he lived amongst us and that he died for us and that he calls us to serve. Loving and serving other people isn't always easy – but we are called to try.

# News from St. Alphege C of E Schools Admissions for September 2021

**Parents** are invited to apply now for places at these excellent schools for entry to **Reception** (infants School), for children who will be 4 by 1<sup>st</sup> September 2021, and for <u>Year 3</u> (Junior School), for children who will be 7 but not 8 by 1<sup>st</sup> September 2021.

The St. Alphege Schools provide a rich and varied curriculum which enables all pupils to achieve the highest standards of which they are capable in a caring, Christian environment. The most recent Religious Education Inspection awarded the top grade, "Excellent", reporting that "*The school's highly distinctive Christian vision, founded on inclusivity and doing the best for every child....is transforming lives and breaking down barriers to academic success and well-being.*" Pupils have moved on from St. Alphege to a number of excellent local schools, particularly Tudor Grange Academy, as many live within that catchment area, but also twelve won places at local Grammar Schools, despite the new arrangements limiting the number of places for children living outside Birmingham. A number also won places at independent schools.

## The Bell Ringers Share an Update

B etween July and early October, we were ringing for Sunday services at St Alphege and we loved being part of the community again. We have been using our local risk assessment, written in accordance with advice from the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers (CCCBR) and the Church of England Recovery Group – as you can imagine, there has been a reliance on hand gel, mask wearing and we have had the windows and doors open, whatever the weather!

We have been touching only one bell rope during the 15-minute sessions and keeping our distance from each other. And therein lies the problem, and the reason for the rather odd-sounding ringing that you were hearing. Whilst we're incredibly lucky to have such a large floor area in our ringing room, our bell ropes are closer than the magic 2 metres and so we were ringing alternate bells unless we had family members with us. So, whilst we would normally have rung bells within a musical scale, we were missing out some of the notes. St Alphege has a beautiful ring of 12 bells but because of the extra effort involved we've also avoided ringing the larger eleventh and twelfth, the tenor bell. All in all, it's not quite what we've all been used to.

Sadly, the CCCBR has now advised us that due to being under local COVID alert level high, we can no longer ring. Whilst church services can go ahead our ringing is considered to breach the guidance for socialising with other households. With no ringing household big enough to make up a band, we are so sorry to have to advise that our bells will need to fall silent again, until the advice changes.

Ringing will continue in medium alert level areas. We know of other towers where their ropes are so close that they have constructed extra rope guides and even a tower where they have raised some of the ropes into a clock room between their ringing room and belfry, from where alternate bells are now rung. We're so fortunate that we've not had to go to these lengths – not least because ringing from a room so close to the bells would be hard work and we rely heavily on seeing each other! I guess this is the pride though, that ringers take in getting back to ringing for their parishes.

Locally, despite the restrictions, we've been pulling together (excuse the pun) and taking it in turns to make up a band. Usually we've rung 6 bells at a time, albeit that this relies heavily on family members being available. We've been pleased that our ringing has also commemorated VJ Day and more recently celebrated the life of George Mullis. George's son, a member of our band returned from the States for the funeral and was also able to toll a bell for his father.

It is breaking our hearts to suspend ringing again but the Church of England and CCCBR continue to meet to discuss how best we can return to normal ringing. We'll be watching closely and updating our risk assessment just as soon as we safely can. So, keep listening out, hopefully we may soon be hearing ringing again and indeed ringing that sounds more familiar. Perhaps even we might be able to recommence practices rather than just relying only on outside handbell sessions and online ringing simulations!

# **Dan Wyman's Ordination**

# Hanging up his Cassock

A fter a long and distinguished career in church music spanning sixty-five years, John Emmett has decided to hang up his cassock.

John joined the choir of St. Matthew's Church, Walsall, as a boy treble, in 1955. Many years later, by then a qualified solicitor, he married Jane and moved to Solihull and, after only a short interlude, he joined the St. Alphege Choir as a bass in 1977 and sang until the end of the Summer term this year. He also sang with the Birmingham Choral Union for a number of years.

He sang, too, in the close harmony group, The Surplus Cassocks, with other Gentlemen from the St. Alphege Choir. This extremely accomplished group entertained at many charity events, often with professionals on the same bill, and raised thousands of pounds for charity, particularly for Cancer Research UK, of the local branch of which John was for many years the Chairman, and for the Friends of St. Alphege Music. He has performed as a soloist and as a member of the Choir in services and concerts in Solihull and travelled with the Choir to sing at many of great cathedrals and churches, in England, Wales – and in Paris.





Believing passionately in the power and beauty of church music to enhance worship, John has always set himself and others the highest standards. A favourite composer? Too many to name – he loves the wide repertoire St. Alphege Choir has always had. Exposing young singers to many types of music he believes is an important part of their musical education.

The Choir, under the direction of Peter

Gregory, reached cathedral standard. When Peter retired, John was invited to take an important role in the selection of his successors. John's love of church music, his musical knowledge and his belief in the importance of maintaining that cathedral standard, ensured that well-qualified Directors of Music were appointed. Nigel Stark created the first girls' and ladies' choirs, which now, as then, perform sometimes separately and sometimes with the boys and men. When Nigel moved to a new post, John was on the panel which appointed the young and hugely talented Joe Cooper; Joe has built on the foundations laid by his predecessors, maintaining and improving the standard of music, further widening the repertoire, developing musical education, reaching out into the community and enabling the choirs to continue to function even in the current Covid crisis.

**Roundabout** John, with Michael Palmer and other Gentlemen of the Choir, realised that the Choir would

need wider and more long-term support. As a result, they founded the Friends of St. Alphege Music in 1978 to support the choirs and musical education. John was the founder Secretary and has subsequently served for two spells as Chairman. One of Joe Cooper's innovations was to establish weekly lunchtime recitals in church, where there had only been monthly performances under Peter Gregory and Nigel Stark. John oversaw the installation and operation of the cameras which show the hands and feet of the organists as they play. It is rare at an organ recital to see the performer playing and this feature of our recitals is greatly appreciated by audiences. John has also helped in many other ways with running the choirs.

For many years, the highlight of the social calendar for the Friends of the Music was the elegant Summer Concert given at John and Jane's home at The Gatehouse. Each year a distinguished professional musician, very often a member of the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, came to give a talk and to play. After the recital, the Friends, with Jane's help, put on a buffet supper. With the audience attired in evening dress, sipping wine and sitting on the terrace to admire the view, these occasions were our very own mini-Glyndebournes. The success of these functions was primarily due to the Emmetts, who worked so hard – willingly surrendering their house and garden to the preparations and the event.

The Choirs at St. Alphege owe an enormous debt to John for his musical, moral and practical support over so many years. The singers and the Friends thank John and wish him and Jane a long and happy – and no doubt musical – retirement.

## **Worship Notes November 2020**

The Feast of All Saints, on 1<sup>st</sup> November, marks the beginning of what has come to be informally named the Kingdom Season. The four Sundays which make up the season are a continuation of 'ordinary time' and used to be part of a series of nine Sundays before Advent. The Church's year draws to its close with the Feast of Christ the King. The liturgical colour for the season is red or green.

#### Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> November – All Saints' Day

All Saints' Day celebrates men and women in whose lives the Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is a time to be encouraged by the example of the saints and to recall that holiness can grow in the ordinary circumstances of human life, as well as in the extraordinary events.

#### Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> November – All Souls' Day

Also known as The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed, this day celebrates the saints in a more local and intimate way. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more directly: those who gave us life, or who nurtured us in faith.

#### Sunday 8th November – Remembrance Sunday

Today across our parish we explore the theme of memory, both corporate and individual, as we confront issues of war and peace, loss and sacrifice. This will be the theme at the morning services across the parish.

#### Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> November – Christ the King

The annual cycle of the Church's year now ends with the Feast of Christ the King. The year that begins with the hope of the coming Messiah ends with the proclamation of his universal rule. The Feast of Christ the King returns us to the Advent theme of judgement, with which the cycle begins once more the following Sunday.

#### Wednesday 25th November

The Dwell service, which will be livestreamed from St Michael's Chapel at 10am, will look ahead to the coming of the Advent season through prayer, music and reflection.

#### Sunday 29th November – First Sunday of Advent

Today a new year begins in the life of the Church. Advent is a season of expectation and preparation, as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming (*adventus*) of Christ in his incarnation, and also looks ahead to his final advent as judge at the end of time.

At the 6.30pm Evensong service from St Alphege, we will commemorate the Eve of the Feast of St Andrew the Apostle.

#### Changes to the services at St Helen's church

Now that the late afternoons and evenings are growing darker and colder, the times of the services at St Helen's will be changing from Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> November onwards. There will still be two services of the Holy Eucharist each Sunday but these will now take place at 9.30am and 11am. As I write this, we are starting to adjust to the new Tier Two status recently announced for Solihull. I hope that everyone remains safe and well, and I urge readers to reach out to the church community if they need support of any kind.

Throughout September, we have been able to work to careful quidelines and risk management to enable a socially distanced choir to sing at the Sunday morning Eucharist at St Alphege, and at our streamed Evensong services on Wednesdays and Sundays. Everyone wears masks, we are distancing at two metres from one another, we have strict hand hygiene in place, and we do lots of cleaning! We hope that this musical element is enhancing worship for members of the congregation, whether they are able to attend church in person or viewing the services online.

Over recent months, we have recruited new young choristers to both the boys' and girls' choirs. It has been a delight to welcome them and they are working very hard to learn music and liturgical content without the normal choir formation which would be to stand probationers next to experienced senior choristers. We are also supplementing their training with online Zoom learning sessions to make the most of the technology we used during the lockdown.

We have just started working on an outreach project for Christmas, where we are working

with local junior-aged children to create a musical virtual Christmas card for the most vulnerable in our local community – look out for more details of this project in next month's Parish News.

# 'Simply Advent' – a Taster

As I begin to type this Pioneer Diary Advent begins in less than seven weeks' time. As you read it Advent will be even closer!

With the year that we've all had, it might be tempting to think that Advent and Christmas won't really happen this year – but we'd be wrong.

Look around you. It is *our* (as humankind) created order that has been disrupted by this pandemic situation, while God's created order has continued unabated – in some places it has even thrived: remember wild Kashmiri goats roaming the streets of Llandudno, Wales, on March 31, 2020? Or the goose that, in May, laid four eggs in 'deserted' York train station?

At the end of the day, no matter how we feel at this present time, the truth that Advent and Christmas point us towards has not changed: *For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.* John 3:16

So let's approach Advent and Christmas this year with renewed fervour, and ignore the cries of the world that their (commercial) Christmas isn't going to happen this year. Let's be the example and show the world how it should be done, all the while exhibiting both 'comfort and joy'\*. And let's begin with Advent.

#### Give Yourself a Break!

This is the strapline for something I've been working on to use during Advent with people in my local area. The purpose of my doing this is to promote Advent (the real meaning, not just the chocolate or gin-filled Advent calendar!?); to experience Advent, both for myself and with others; and to connect with the local community. As I type Simply Advent is still coming together in my thoughts and prayers, but the general gist is that we 'gift ourselves' an hour a week during Advent and take a break. During this hour we have a coffee (other refreshments are available!), and maybe a mince pie, and think about a theme for that week. I will be connecting with the Church of England's theme of 'comfort and joy' i, but other themes might include things like 'Be still'; 'give thanks'; and 'Nativity'.

In order to get my mind into thinking 'Advent' I have been using some of the Advent literature that I already own and value. Things like:

- 'Making Christmas Happen'<sup>ii</sup> by Susan Sayers, who offers 'daily reflections to help you keep the sparkle in all the preparations'. This book introduces weekly themes that help us cover cards and gifts; decking the halls; carol singing; and festive food and drink.
- `Do Nothing, Christmas is Coming'<sup>ii</sup> by Stephen Cottrell, who offers `an Advent Calendar with a difference'. This book offers us daily thoughts laced with wisdom and humour, as well as a moment to stop and think. (Personally I think it's a good one for Christians and non-Christians alike. Suzette.)



# Pioneer Diary

 'Walking through Advent'<sup>ii</sup> by Jan Sutch Pickard, who offers daily readings and prayers based around Micah 6:8 – 'What does the Lord ask of you? To love mercy, act justly and walk humbly with your God.' This book takes us on a walk through Advent (walking is another of my favourite things! Suzette) reminding us that 'sometimes (wherever you are) it is hard going' (how apt for 2020! Suzette) and that 'most of all we are helped by the knowledge that God walks with us'.

Of course, with the way things have been and continue to be in 2020, the way we all journey through Advent and celebrate Christmas will be different this year. I am preparing Simply Advent knowing that I already have two people who are interested but not knowing whether we will be able to meet by then. However, as someone has reminded us recently, different does not have to mean 'worse'. Instead it's time to reimagine Advent and Christmas – to make them happen in a new way; to give ourselves a break and maybe do nothing from time to time to connect more deeply with our God; firm in the knowledge that all that is asked of us is 'To love mercy, act justly and walk humbly with your God.' If we can do that, we can't fail to shine and set an example for those around us.

God, who walks with us, Give us imagination, courage, grace To be companions of the Way. Amen.<sup>III</sup>

If you are dropping your message at the office, please pay by cheque when you submit your entry. If you are e-mailing, please provide your address and phone number: we will send you an invoice on 1<sup>st</sup> December giving you the option to pay by bank transfer or cheque.

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# Heather's Story – 'Yes to Life'

**"Saying Yes to Life"** by Ruth Valerio was our Lent book this year at Ascension Stirchley. Each week we read a chapter, watched the YouTube videos, and reflected on its message. Christiana Figueres, former head of UN Climate Change Convention, in her interview, <u>https://youtu.be/UQ387Xs8Bks</u>, spoke passionately about how it is the responsibility of us all to put our energies into doing everything we can to address climate change now!

I bought her book "The Future We Choose" where she paints starkly contrasted pictures of what life will be like in 2050 if we address climate change now, and if we don't. She describes her journey from hopelessness around climate change to "Stubborn Optimism" where with the support of her daily spiritual practice, she wakes each day choosing to do all she can to address it. I was so inspired I bought three extra copies of the book to give to friends whom I hope will share the message.

She, like Ruth, makes the link with climate change and all injustice and calls us as followers of Christ to work alongside those who are suffering to try to bring about justice. For me this was an epiphany. I wanted to get involved, I contacted a friend and joined the local Anglican Group, Birmingham Anglicans for Climate Action (BACA).

Others in Ascension Stirchley and the Lent Group had been on this journey since the 1980s, buying Ecover Products for as long as they could remember. During Lent we were encouraged to take small actions which if carried out collectively would have a real impact, like charging our phones during the day, rather than leaving them on charge all night and supporting each other to change our habit.

During lockdown the Ascension WhatsApp group was buzzing with ideas about composting, growing vegetables, sharing soup recipes to use tired vegetables and recycling. People shielding left surplus plants for others to grow. Photos of the resulting beans were shared and celebrated. Concern about tackling slugs was shared and imaginative strategies suggested. On a recent gardening project to tidy the frontage of the church, for the removal of the railings, we retained the trees which produce the berries which the birds love. Yes, we tidied up, but in line with nature.

To confirm our renewed enthusiasm and shape future actions we signed up to Eco Church. Eco Church (an initiative set up by the environmental organisation A Rocha and widely adopted within the Diocese and the CofE nationally) has helped create a church culture where care for the environment is important.

Two examples:

- It has focussed our attention on what we buy. A recent Church Council meeting agreed to purchase supplies in line with our values, even though it may be financially challenging.
- It has made us think harder about how we get around. Cycling is encouraged our vicar is often seen cycling around the parish, and one of us has even bought a tricycle having never learnt to ride a two wheeler!

We are trying to always consider the impact of our actions on our planet whether it's the plastic and recyclability of the presents from Father Christmas at our Christmas Fair, switching off lights in our church hall when not needed, or what to do about heating for evening meetings during winter, we are trying to play our part as Ascension Stirchley. Will you play yours by signing up to Eco Church?

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### Matters of Faith

### Why I Read the Bible

 $\mathbf{I}$  n last month's article, *How I read the Bible,* I was concerned to point out that there could be a more helpful way of reading the Bible than from beginning to end. This month, I want to develop the equally important question of *Why* I read the Bible. Somebody once described our sacred scriptures as God's love story. I like that idea, but it needs developing, because I can't help thinking that the Bible is a very strange love story.

There is a lingering idea in the minds of many Christians that God wrote the Bible, therefore it must somehow be literally true from beginning to end. Let's dispense with that notion from the start. It was <u>people</u> who wrote the Bible, and what they wrote was edited by other people. They were doing this, on and off, over a period of more than a thousand years, from about 1000 BC to about AD 120, specifically during the time of the Babylonian exile during the sixth century BC.

So, who were these people? Well, most of them are unknown. They were nearly all members of a small ethnic group, living very precariously on that small strip of land at the East end of the Mediterranean which we call the Holy Land. Their world bore little resemblance to ours. It was bereft of all the modern conveniences that we take for granted. It was a world which was disease-ridden and violent, in which people who survived childhood would have thought themselves very fortunate if they lived beyond the age of forty.

Those people, the Jews, considered themselves to be specialists in religion. Not long before the time of Jesus, their scholars assembled a collection of carefully selected and edited scrolls, which they revered then and ever after as their sacred Scriptures. We call this collection The Old Testament. A short time after this, a breakaway group, the early Christian Church, added to this Old Testament an astonishing postscript of writings concerning the life, death and resurrection of Jesus the Messiah. We know these writings as The New Testament.

#### Uncomfortable

The Bible is an extraordinary mixture of fact and fiction, legends and myths, folk tales and fables, outdated laws and irrelevant regulations. It also contains a sizeable proportion of downright outrageous comments and opinions that in today's world are quite unacceptable. By contrast, one also finds poetry and imagination, uplifting and beautiful songs, inspiring and meaningful stories and parables, and some essential moral guidance.

Most of the people who were responsible for the Old Testament had a restricting and often uncomfortable idea of God. Like the pagan peoples around them, they had a tendency to create a God in the image of humanity. He was male, and generally thought to inhabit a realm that was out of reach, but located not very far above the (flat) world.

In the Old Testament, with a few notable exceptions, this God bears some of the least appealing of human traits. For example, he is often vengeful and very quick to administer severe and sometimes cruel punishment. He causes disasters, plagues and infestations. He seems to think that wars and combat are the only way to settle disputes. He appears to be racist, he condones slavery, he has no particular respect for children, he imposes laws and regulations many of which are virtually impossible to abide by, and he demands to be worshipped by means of elaborate rituals and sacrifices.

In this way, the Old Testament God is not unlike the gods of heathen peoples, the super-beings said to dwell in Valhalla or on Mount Olympus. I am therefore content to leave aside and ignore a great deal of the Bible's historical writings as irrelevant, along with many of its folk tales and legends, and its laws and instructions for living.

There are specialists in these matters who can be consulted if one is interested.

#### Salvation

So why is the Bible so important? The short answer is, the Bible is important because it contains the story of salvation which comes to a climax in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus the Messiah. This is why it is God's love story. In order to appreciate this fully, it will help if we bear in mind three basic elements essential to humanity that authentic religion is always concerned with: firstly faith, secondly community, thirdly morality. In other words:

#### BELIEVING BELONGING BEHAVING

**Believing** is emphatically not believing everything that you read in the Bible is true. Very simply, believing is having faith and trust in God who is above all and yet who is in all, who is transcendent and unknowable and yet who is known, who is a spiritual reality beyond all human understanding and yet who is experienced within creation.

**Belonging** is to do with our human connectedness. It is expressing the loving Godpresence in society and community, our need for God and for one another.

**Behaving** is to do with our moral compass. It derives from Belonging, shown in the evident need for self-discipline and respect for others.

In spite of all its curious contents, its errors and inconsistencies, the Bible is paramount among the sacred scriptures of the world in demonstrating the vital importance of each of these three cornerstones of human existence. In addition to that, the Bible contains the greatest and most authentic story of salvation. This is flagged up in the Old Testament (particularly in the prophetic writings), and culminates in the Christ event on which the New Testament writings are based.

The Bible is indeed inspired by the Spirit of God. It therefore deserves not to be worshipped, but to be revered. Its writings are to be read, studied, analysed and carefully interpreted, and, above all, to be approached with faith and common sense.





Sadly, due to the Government rules which restrict social gatherings, we shall not be able to meet for the forseeable future. We'll keep you informed if things change.
