BIBLE READINGS 1 Genesis 14.17-20

After Abram returned from defeating Kedorlaomer and the kings allied with him, the king of Sodom came out to meet him in the Valley of Shaveh (that is, the King's Valley).

Then Melchizedek king of Salem brought out bread and wine. He was priest of God Most High, and he blessed Abram, saying,

"Blessed be Abram by God Most High, Creator of heaven and earth. And praise be to God Most High, who delivered your enemies into your hand."

Then Abram gave him a tenth of everything.

NEW TESTAMENT Revelation 19, 6-10

Then I heard what seemed to be the voice of a great multitude, like the sound of many waters and like the sound of mighty thunder-peals, crying out,

'Hallelujah! For the Lord our God the Almighty reigns. Let us rejoice and exult and give him the glory, for the marriage of the Lamb has come, and his bride has made herself ready; to her it has been granted to be clothed with fine linen, bright and pure'— for the fine linen is the righteous deeds of the saints.

And the angel said to me, 'Write this: Blessed are those who are invited to the marriage supper of the Lamb.' And he said to me, 'These are true words of God.' Then I fell down at his feet to worship him, but he said to me, 'You must not do that! I am a fellow-servant with you and your comrades who hold the testimony of Jesus. Worship God! GOSPEL John 2.1-11

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him; 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

This is a joint announcement from The Revd Canon Jane Kenchington and the Bishop of Birmingham:

Following appropriate consultation, Canon Jane Kenchington will take early retirement on grounds of ill health. These things are mostly confidential, but Canon Jane assures everyone that this difficult decision has been taken to ensure she can flourish now and in the future. This has been approved by the CofE Pensions Board's expert advisers.

Canon Jane says, 'it has been a great privilege to serve in both Gloucester and Birmingham dioceses and most recently here in the Solihull Team. It has been good to see how the church and people have developed here in these last 5 years, and I am confident of Christ's continued presence with us all in these uncertain times. My sincere and heartfelt thanks to all our volunteers and staff, lay and ordained who have shared in ministry.'

Bishop David comments, 'Canon Jane has been a great colleague in the service of God's people and the community in Solihull. I am sure we will consider her time here as being of great importance in the task of sharing the good news of Jesus Christ. Knowing that we never retire from Christ's call and love, I wish Jane and her family every blessing for the years ahead.'

Canon Jane's retirement will take effect from 1st February 2021, although she and Richard will remain in the rectory for a few months as their new house is prepared. The parish will be planning appropriate farewells, within the COVID-19 guidance and current Lockdown regulations. The vacancy from 1/2/21 will proceed as normal under the oversight of Parish wardens and Area Dean, supporting the volunteers, staff and clergy of Solihull Parish.

Community Champions 20th January 2021

Figures - The rate in Solihull has declined by 3% and has levelled off at 517.2 per 100,000, but this is a very high level. Lockdown is working, but the new variant is responsible for 80% of cases so it is hard to get the rate down. 16% of people tested are positive. Spread is mainly through shops and workplaces; be very wary of deliveries of food, post and parcels. There has been an increase in numbers in the North of the Borough, particularly amongst key workers.

Testing and Self-isolation - If you have any symptoms, do get tested and follow the rules of self-isolation. The 10-day self-isolation period is critical for anyone testing positive or who is in contact with someone positive. Even if the person in contact receives a negative test result they should still self-isolate. There should be no 'just popping out'. This is very important if we are to stop the spread.

It is difficult for people to self-isolate so many have been avoiding getting tested. Solihull has a discretionary payment scheme to help people who have to stay off work. There is also a helpline for people who need help with shopping or dog-walking.

From today, Tudor Grange Sports Centre is open for the testing of key workers without symptoms. It is recommended that they get tested twice a week. There is an online booking system on the SMBC website for appointments. North Solihull Sports Centre will be open for the same thing from next week.

Receiving a negative test result is not a golden ticket to go out and do as you like. All the precautions of Hands – Face – Space should be adhered to.

Vaccinations In Solihull - Over 10,000 people aged 80+ have been vaccinated. Things are moving quickly and they are doing the 70+ age group now, together with wider social care staff and the clinically vulnerable. There are currently no concerns about the supply of vaccine. Vaccinated people can still transmit the virus. The vaccine gives them more confidence to go out but they should not be breaking the guidelines any more than previously. A word of advice: please turn up for your vaccination in suitable clothing with sleeves easy to roll up. The process is being slowed up by people having to undress and dress again!
