BIBLE READINGS Genesis 17. 1-7 & 15 & 16

When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to Abram, and said to him, 'I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous.' Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, 'As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you. God said to Abraham, 'As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her.'

NEW TESTAMENT Romans 4. 13-25

The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become 'the father of many nations', according to what was said, 'So numerous shall your descendants be.' He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore his faith 'was reckoned to him as righteousness.' Now the words, 'it was reckoned to him', were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

GOSPEL Mark 8. 31-end

Jesus began to teach his disciples that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.' He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'

Almighty God, you show to those who are in error the light of your truth, that they may return to the way of righteousness: grant to all those who are admitted into the fellowship of Christ's religion, that they may reject those things that are contrary to their profession, and follow all such things as are agreeable to the same; through our Lord Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Covid 19 testing kits now easier to order - People who do not have access to the internet can now order PCR home testing kits over the phone by calling 119, without needing an email address or any other digital requirement.

This means that people without access to the internet or digital services can order PCR tests to use in their homes, if they have symptoms. The home testing service is available to everyone in the United Kingdom with COVID-19 symptoms, and can still be accessed through the <u>home testing online portal</u>.

Community Champions News 25.02.21 Figures

There has been a continued sharp fall in cases in Solihull. The rate is now 134 per 100,000 and 98.7 per 100,000 in the 60+ age group. This is where we were at the beginning of last December and we still need these figures to go right down to further reduce the risk. The Kent variant, the main one in the UK, is keeping the others at bay but spreads very rapidly. 6.6% of people being tested are positive but fewer people are going for tests. Please do go for a test if you have any symptoms; if you go out to a workplace, you should be testing 2 to 3 times a week.

Vaccinations

There has been a high uptake by all groups so far. Everyone who has been vaccinated once still needs to stay on guard – they are not fully protected yet. There are side effects to all vaccines, not just Covid ones, and these are completely normal. There is a lot of confidence in the Covid vaccines so, just as with the flu vaccines, just accept whichever you are offered. We now need to build up confidence in vaccine refusers, to encourage them to get vaccinated. There is lots of research-based information at https://covid.joinzoe.com/blog. Census 2021

We heard from Fiona, the Census Community Engagement Manager for Solihull.

The census is taken by the Office of National Statistics every 10 years (in years ending in a 1) to plan needs for the present and future. It helps Local Authorities to plan their services (e.g. how many school places will be needed) and it is also used by charities, businesses, university researchers and people doing family histories. It is independent of Government and political parties. All the information is kept confidential and secure. Any figures accessed or published do not identify individuals, so it cannot be used to check benefit claims, income tax or residency status. Individual household info is only released after 100 years.

This year, the census will be collected almost entirely online; they are hoping for a 70% return by this method. A postcard will arrive telling you that you can soon fill in your form; then, from 1st March onwards, a pack will arrive with your access code. You can fill in the

form online straightaway after 1st March, although 21st March is the official census day. Online completion is easier as it automatically excludes irrelevant questions and jumps to the next relevant one. The census form is in English, or in Welsh if you live in Wales.

If you would prefer to complete a paper version, you can request a paper copy as soon as the pack arrives in the post – the details are in the pack.

Help is available whether you complete your form online or on a paper copy. Details will be in the pack. **This help is free**. Do not accept any offer of help which says there will be a charge. Help can be via:

Neighbours or family – but keep to the Covid restrictions and do this by phone.

There will be a telephone helpline available – the number will be in the pack.

Support and guidance leaflets are available in many languages.

Large print versions of the form are available, as is text relay help for the hearing impaired.

ONS Field Staff can visit, will be PPE equipped, and will only stay on your doorstep for a short time. They will not come inside.

To end on a lighter note, the ONS wish they had had up to date census information

available before Covid. Apparently 102% of over 80s in Solihull have been vaccinated!
