## Editorial

The 21<sup>st</sup> chapter of John's gospel opens with an event which is both a miracle story and also a resurrection appearance of Jesus. Early one morning, Jesus goes to the shore of the Sea of Galilee where he finds seven of his disciples out fishing on the lake. They have just finished a night's work, but have caught nothing. But they still have enough strength to follow Jesus' instructions to let down their nets into a particular part of the lake and, after doing so, they haul in a bumper catch of fish.

The focus of this story is the disciple Peter, but it is the enigmatic 'disciple whom Jesus loved' who is the first to point out that the figure standing on the shore is none other than Jesus. Once the bulging net has been dragged ashore, the disciples find Jesus waiting for them by a charcoal fire on which fish is already cooking, with bread alongside. He invites the disciples to come and have breakfast.

So what is going on here? The beginning of the story makes clear that some of the disciples - seven in number, including Peter - have returned to their old trade ("I'm going out to fish," Simon Peter told them, and they said, "We'll go with you." - John 21.3), and there seems to be no indication of how the events of the last three years have affected them. Even though we know that they have all recently encountered the Risen Jesus, and received a new mission from him (see John 20.19-29), all of that seems to have faded from the disciples' memories.

There is still a little more to understand: once their meal is finished, Jesus finally speaks directly to Peter, asking him three questions as a counter to the three times Peter denied knowing Jesus. His first question to Peter is: 'Do you love me more than these?' This might mean one of a number of things: it might mean 'Am I more important to you than the material goods of the fisherman's trade?'. Or, perhaps, the meaning is, 'Do you love me more than you love the other disciples?' Or even, 'Do you love me more than the other disciples love me?'

Each interpretation has its own implications and possibilities, but we can see that Jesus doesn't pretend that Peter's denials didn't happen and didn't hurt. But neither does Jesus preach, condemn, accuse, or retaliate. He feeds.

He feeds Peter's body and then he feeds Peter's soul. He surrounds the self-loathing disciple with tenderness and safety, inviting him to revisit his failings for the sake of healing, restoration, and commissioning: "Do you love me?... Do you love me?... Do you love me?... Feed my sheep."

I wonder what our failures would feel like if we offered each other the safety Jesus offered to Peter: the safety to return to the heart of our wrongdoing and despair; the safety to use new words to speak about our failure; the safety to experience unconditional love?

What would our witness look like if the Church embodied Jesus' way of reconciliation? What would the world be like if Christians were known as the people to run to in times of failure or shame? Could we, like Jesus, become a place of sanctuary for the despairing?

To end, I offer the following prayer, which may help us to contemplate this opportunity:

May I become at all times, both now and forever, A protector for those without protection; A guide for those who have lost their way; A ship for those with oceans to cross; A bridge for those with rivers to cross; A sanctuary for those in danger; A lamp for those without light; A place of refuge for those who lack shelter; And a servant to all in need. Amen.

The Ringers are gearing up ready to get involved in the Flower Festival with our theme of Royal Ringing. So we look forward to seeing you all over the Platinum Jubilee weekend festivities. We're hoping we can talk to parishioners and visitors alike and introduce them to our love of ringing. The band are as enthusiastic as ever, but we really are short on numbers, particularly at holiday times, so we'd love to encourage a few more people to come and see what it's all about. Tempted? Do get in touch, don't wait for the Flower Festival, just give us a shout. You can find more details on the church website. www.solihullparish.org.uk/st-alphege-bellringers/ We're now looking to have those that teach bell handling accredited by the Association of Ringing Teachers and follow their training programme which will only add to the many, many years of teaching experience that we have between us. If we don't see you before, do come along and meet us over the Bank Holiday weekend and learn a little about the ringing we have done for royal events.

You may have been hearing the bells ringing more often on recent Wednesday evenings? We've been hosting some additional practices to increase our expertise, ringing on higher numbers, ringing 10 and 12 bells at one time. The practices include members of the St. Martin's Guild of Bellringers, the Birmingham Diocese's Guild. The St. Martin's Guild has a world-wide reputation for ringing on higher numbers, having won the National 12 Bell Striking Competition on many occasions, so we're in good hands when they come along and help us out.

Our bells themselves have an excellent reputation for their quality. As ringing has opened up again following the pandemic, we have started to welcome visiting bands. On Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> March we hosted ringers from Bath who rang 5042 changes of Cambridge Surprise (3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hours of non-stop ringing) and on 2<sup>nd</sup> May we welcomed ringers from the Guildford area who wanted to experience ringing on our wonderful bells. On 18<sup>th</sup> June another group of ringers from Bath will be here and on 29<sup>th</sup> August the President of the Central Council of Church Bellringers is arranging for a band to join him here too.

Whilst we have some very well-known and very experienced ringers coming to Solihull, our local band are an informal and friendly bunch. So why not come and see us and learn more about our beautiful bells and understand why we've all fallen in love with the tower and bells of Solihull.

## **Worship Notes June 2022**

The month of June is full of feast days and celebrations!

**Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> June - The Day of Pentecost**, the day which Christians celebrate as the 'birthday' of the Church!

#### Friday 11<sup>th</sup> June - Barnabas the Apostle

Though not named among the twelve apostles in the gospels, Barnabas emerges in the book of Acts as one of the most significant of their number. He is described as a Levite from Cyprus so, like his friend Paul, was from the Greek world rather than that of Palestine, and he introduced Paul to the leaders of the Church in Jerusalem. He was sent to Antioch apparently to guide the Christians there in their relations with non-Jewish converts, promoting the concept of all being one in Christ.

#### Sunday 12th June - Trinity Sunday

This is one of the few celebrations of the Christian Year that commemorates a reality and doctrine rather than a person or event. Today we remember and honour the eternal God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

The Trinity is one of the most fascinating - and challenging! - Christian teachings. The Trinity is described as a "mystery", a reality above our human comprehension that we may begin to grasp, but ultimately must know through worship, symbol, and faith.

#### Thursday 16th June - Day of Thanksgiving for Holy Communion (Corpus Christi)

The Thursday after Trinity Sunday was chosen for the date of the Corpus Christi feast because it is the same day of the week that Christ instituted the Eucharist (which we celebrate on Maundy Thursday). Observance of this feast dates from the 13th Century.

Many might remember that the Catechism in the Book of Common Prayer asks the confirmand, 'Why was the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper ordained?' The confirmand answers, 'For the continual remembrance of the sacrifice of the death of Christ, and of the benefits which we receive thereby.' This, and many other wonderful aspects of the Eucharist, is celebrated today.

#### Tuesday 22<sup>nd</sup> June - St Alban

Alban was a soldier in the Roman city of Verulamium (now St. Albans) who gave shelter to a Christian priest fleeing from persecution, hiding him in his house for several days. Greatly influenced by his devotion to prayer, Alban received instruction from the priest and was converted. When the priest's hiding-place was discovered, Alban dressed himself in the priest's cloak and was arrested in his place. Tortured by the Roman authorities, Alban refused to renounce his faith. He was beheaded on this day, probably in the year 250, and so became the first British martyr.

#### Thursday 24th June - The Birth of John the Baptist

The story of the birth of John, the son of Elizabeth and Zechariah, is told in chapter 1 of Luke's gospel. However, John's story begins even before his birth. His leaping in his mother's womb is seen as a great 'alleluia' in anticipation of the birth of his Redeemer. Each of the four gospel writers relate the good news of Jesus Christ as beginning with John as Christ's forerunner.

## St Michael

## St Michael's Distant Voices CD

The Distant Voices band of St. Michael's Church comprises many talented musicians, singers, technicians, enthusiastic supporters and artists who got together to make music over lockdown. It all started with a comment by Mike Abrams in April 2020 who asked if it was possible for people to record musical parts at home – on their phones or computers – and somehow combine them together. Fortunately, the technology to do this is accessible nowadays and within a short time we were very encouraged to have produced our first couple of hymns. It really sounded as though everyone was playing together in the same room, although we never actually met in person.

To help us organise all this, we arranged a weekly 'Zoom' session – a way of seeing and speaking to each other on our computers. We talked about planning the music, of course, but spent a great deal of the time talking about everything else under the sun – knitting and baking were two regular topics, and of course checking that each of us was managing in lockdown.

Bruce Hart organised the group and provided the much-needed technical expertise, and amazing support was provided by Fr. Simon Marshall who seems to know about copyright, YouTube and much more! And credit to the musicians themselves who worked so hard in recording their parts – it takes a lot of skill and focus to record a part with no mistakes from start to finish.

At some point, after the band had recorded over 50 hymns and other songs, someone suggested that we published a CD (although it's hard to know where the idea of the CD actually came from). The music was already available on YouTube where it had an active global following and regular plays every month. However, it was thought that a CD would make the music accessible to a wider audience, especially those who were less adept in using computers. The band members told Bruce which songs were their favourites and there were also some votes from family members. In the end it was a really difficult job to decide which songs to include. We were fortunate that Anne-Marie England even had a stockpile of blank CDs that we could use, whereas most of us in the pandemic years stockpiled loo rolls.

Emily Robinson provided the artwork because the rainbow was such a pandemic symbol and of course much of the music reminds us of God's promise of faithfulness and peace to humankind.

The CD has over half an hour of music and costs just  $\pounds$ 4 and is available from St. Michael's Church. All proceeds go towards St. Michael's Church.

## **Pioneer Diary**

## 'Group' or 'Community'?

O n the face of it, the answer to the above question may appear to be an easy one: surely you just take each situation and apply 'group' or 'community' to them, such as a family group, or a group of friends, as opposed to the community that we live in, or a religious community of nuns or monks. In practice, however, I have found that the answer to this question is not so simple, and I am still unpacking it about my work. Let me explain further:

Picture a table – for accuracy in fact it's two tables pushed together – and around this table are no less than 15 people. Five at one end of the table are playing a game. Others are chatting, drinking, laughing; some are on slightly higher chairs, some are on garden chairs. There's reminiscing, stories about dogs getting loose, lots more laughter, Easter eggs, and the planning of future events. At times there are also slight irritations and misunderstandings, but they're fleeting and, when most have left - one after sharing their burdens with a listening ear - three stay on for lunch, all the while caring for the one among them who needs some extra help that day. During all of this, on the wall behind the table, there is a notice, declaring that this is a place to "meet, relax and refuel." This was 'Wellbeing Wednesday' in Holy Week. Our busiest day to date.

That day I saw a 'shift' in the group. I saw connecting, fellowship, hospitality, sharing and caring at its best. This led me to say that it may not be church – but it is growing community. But what do I mean by that? Let's look at some definitions that might help:

#### **Group** – a definition

According to the Cambridge Dictionary a group is "a number of people or things that are put together or considered as a unit". For example, *I'm meeting a group of friends for dinner tonight* or, in our case, "*I'm meeting a group of folks at Wellbeing Wednesday this morning."* So, Wellbeing Wednesday began as a group. That seems obvious. But what makes a community?

#### **Community – a definition**

Once again, we turn to the Cambridge Dictionary for our definition, this time of community: "The people living in one particular area or people who are considered as a unit because of their common interests, social group, or nationality."

Now, I don't know about you but, in my mind, there is a big difference between a group and a community. However, as you can see, when we look at straight definitions of both, there isn't much of a difference. So, just *what* did I observe that Holy Week at Wellbeing Wednesday? What was the *shift* that made me think community rather than group?

Not surprisingly, to answer that question we must turn to the Bible. The Bible has quite a bit to say about community and fellowship. It is, after all, one of the key components to making the church a unified body of believers rather than just a bunch of people meeting together. I was drawn to this one verse from Ecclesiastes 4:9:10:

Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labour. If either of them falls down, one can help the other up. But pity anyone who falls and has no one to help them up (NIV).

As human beings made in the image of God, we were created to need companionship and we do better when we have someone to love, serve with, have fun with, and live life with. That is what I saw – or sensed – that Wednesday in Holy Week: the depths of relationships that are forming within the group. A blossoming community. Please remember us in your prayers. Thank you.

Are you a part of a group or a community? How do you measure the difference?

#### **Postscript to May's Pioneer Diary:**

We have had two of our weekend Wellbeing Walks since I wrote about them in May's magazine. On 3<sup>rd</sup> April there were seven of us out walking around Brueton Park (with 3 apologies); and on 1<sup>st</sup> May there were six of us out walking along the canal to Catherine de Barnes in the rain (with 8 apologies). Our next walk will be on Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> June, and we plan on calling into the St. Alphege Flower Festival somewhere along our route. More details will be available nearer the time.

P.S. If you are wondering why I count apologies, it's because it shows a commitment to the group, even if they can't make it on that date. Maybe that can be seen as a commitment to community? Do chat with me about it next time you see me.

### **Update from the Parish Wardens**

The month of May will have seen the Action Morning in Barston when we will have set some priorities for our Transforming Church Action Plan (T.C.A.P.) and we will report back on these priorities which, we pray, will help us move forward with our mission, and seeking to encourage more people to faith and into our fellowships and congregations.

The process of recruiting a Priest in Charge (Rector Designate) has been a bit delayed but we are in touch with Archdeacon Jenny Tomlinson and we trust that by the time you read this the advertisement will have been placed; interviews will take place in June or early July.

We are continuing to review work with young people and will shortly be moving forward on an appointment here too. We are also very aware that work need to be done to provide something for our young adults.

We were much blessed by the Easter services and activities which helped us all to give thanks for the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. These included *The Easter Story* presentations, *Stations of the Cross*, the well-attended *Walk of Witness, Tenebrae Service*, Easter Day *Dawn Service* in Oak Cottage Garden, and a large attendance for the Easter Day Eucharist at St. Alphege when we said goodbye to Father Andrew.

We had our Annual Parish Meetings at the end of April when reports were presented on many aspects of Parish life in the past year. If you were not able to be there and would like to see the reports, they are available on ChurchBuilder or there may be a few copies from the Parish Office.

The repairs to St. Alphege Church are now well underway in stages – it is expected that they will be completed by the Autumn. We do apologise for the inconvenience caused but these repairs are essential. We do thank Phil Godfrey for overseeing this so well and to the Guardians for so generously paying for the vast majority of this work.

The Platinum Jubilee Celebrations will soon be upon us with a Flower Festival in St. Alphege for the whole Parish, a Platinum Jubilee Tea from the Mothers' Union, and the Grand Concert from the Choir.

### Chris Thomas on his visit to the Taizé community in Burgundy, France

In our June Eucharists at St. Alphege, we will be introducing some Taizé chants as the communion hymn.

In a visit to the Taizé Community earlier in my career, I was very fortunate to meet Brother Xavier, a Belgian who had been there for three years as a 'singing' brother. I was armed with a few questions—and here is an extract, with the answers paraphrased from his broken English.

**Chris**: There is something special here, when two thousand young people are gathered in a mood of silent expectancy, to the clear, clean tones of a Baroque organ playing some Pachelbel, Bach or Buxtehude fugue, followed by a full three minutes' silence; then a brother chants an Alleluia, to which everyone responds in rich harmony, without announcement or visible leader.

**Brother Xavier**: We learn to sing in harmony and to 'carry our part' at the daily practice, to which everyone is invited. About once a week we use other instruments in the chants, if the players are good enough. Otherwise, it's all unaccompanied.

Chris: Why do you sing the chants so many times?

**Brother Xavier**: Because some of the time you can sing, and sometimes you can pray without singing. We always write it down and rehearse it together.

**Chris:** The style of your music doesn't feature any of the elements common with today's youth music; no percussion instruments, blues harmony or persistent beat, no great complexity of rhythm or simultaneity.

**Brother Xavier:** In another community those things might be appropriate. But ours is a community of peace and reconciliation, and our musical style fits this. Also we do not have sentimental music. We try to use only music that has objectivity, so that you can set any prayer to it. Baroque harmony and Bach chorales seem good for this.

Chris: Surely young people become bored with this!

**Brother Xavier:** No, we don't find this. But we must admit that <u>we</u> get bored! Visitors come for one day, one week, a fortnight, and they attend three services a day and sing one hundred of our songs. But there are not many more than these hundred so we who are here all year sing the same songs a lot!

Chris: Has the style of your music changed over the years?

**Brother Xavier:** Our style has been the same for a long time. But in a few years, who knows it might change. But that doesn't matter—we don't plan ahead. The Lord teaches us to live in the present, and not worry what style to use tomorrow.

## Major Works to the Windows and Stonework Begin at St. Alphege

**S** caffolding and tall timber supports are in place around the North porch of St. Alphege as we go to press, ready for work to begin on the porch. This is the first phase of the programme to restore some of the stonework and windows at St. Alphege. The huge vertical baulks of timber resemble a Roman fort rather than a Medieval church, but it is good to know that important maintenance is to begin. The porch dates from c.1350 so it is not the oldest part of the building, but it is still over six and a half centuries since it was built, so it is entitled to great care. We are perhaps the twenty-sixth generation to have the duty of preserving this church, which is quite a sobering thought. While the work is taking place on site, entry to the building at times may be via the West door only, parts of the churchyard may be closed for a while, and there may be other inconveniences, but services and events will go ahead as planned. By the time the work is finished, the fabric of the Medieval building will have been secured and the stained-glass windows saved from further damage. As the work progresses, Parish News will publish updates. The Church apologises for any inconvenience caused.

Matters of Faith

### **Big Questions**

I have the good fortune to be living in a freehold property. However, I have always had a nagging question for which, so far, I have not found the answer. I know that, in law, I own the house and garden: but how much of the ground underneath do I own? In other words, How far <u>down</u> do I own? Five feet, ten feet? Or perhaps as far as the centre of the planet?

Well: as it happens, there is a clear Biblical answer. I am not actually the owner of anything! Neither above ground, nor below it. Psalm 24 tells me that. It begins emphatically: "The earth is Lord's, and all that is in it." That's not just poetry: it is fact. The Lord God created all that there is, and God is the owner of all creation, including our planet.

This fact is declared unequivocally in the Torah, the divine law books of the Old Testament. "The land shall not be sold in perpetuity, for the land is <u>mine</u> (says the Lord) . . . <u>you</u> are but temporary dwellers and tenants." This timeless truth is backed up by the story of Ahab and Naboth's vineyard which you can read in 1 Kings chapter 21. It is referred to again in Ezekiel 46.18 and echoed in the New Testament in 1 Corinthians 10.26.

It is perhaps obvious that this spiritual truth has tremendous environmental implications about which we are all now more aware. It is, to say the least, encouraging that we are at last beginning to respond positively to the tragedy of having mis-managed the planet, especially during the past two centuries, almost to the point of extinction. It is indeed a "do or die" scenario. We are stewards of what God has creatively provided for us, whether globally, or in terms of our so-called private possessions.

#### **Equitable Justice**

Stewardship is one of two great themes which run together through the Bible. The other one is equitable sharing, or *distributive justice*. This theme is particularly highlighted in the prophetic writings. The prophets repeatedly rebuke society for ignoring the needs of the destitute, of refugees, of widows and orphans, and of those unable for whatever reason to fend for themselves. I won't give Bible references for this: all you need to do is to open your Bible and look at a few pages in any of the books of the prophets.

We do need to realise, however, that the modern world has not yet seriously addressed this problem, even after 2000 years of Christianity. The tentative attempts of socialism in Western society during the past two hundred years have made a faltering start, but we know that there still remains a scandalous, and indeed growing, gap between the 'haves' and the 'have-nots', both locally and globally. Mending the environment will be to no avail, merely a meaningless exercise, if we do not urgently find ways of re-adjusting the world's economics in favour of those suffering deprivation. Charity is admirable, but, in this respect, it is of very limited use without matching political will.

These are indeed big questions, and we cannot side-step them. But I would still like to know, sooner or later, how much ground I am supposed to "own" beneath my feet! Any answers?

## Women's Theology Group



The Women's Theology Group meets in the evening on the second Wednesday of the month, on Zoom at present, to study and discuss passages from the Bible, to consider appropriate Christian responses to current issues and to pray and support each other in faith. Previous sessions of Women's Theology have focussed on the life of Julian of Norwich, the Christian response to transgender and the story of Abigail in 1 Samuel.

Our most recent session explored the topic of **Living in the age of 'Post-Truth' as a Christian and how we respond to it as Christians.** "Post-Truth" was Word of the Year in 2016.

The discussion touched on aspects such as social media, populism in politics, data harvesting, and celebrity culture. A Post-Truth situation could be defined as on in which people are less influenced by factual information than by their emotions or by beliefs they already hold. We looked at how this situation could have developed, especially at the growth of social media where publishing people's views is unregulated and there has been a rise in conspiracy theories. Many see the economic problems following the 2008 financial crash which led to over twelve years of austerity and record amounts of income inequality as an important cause. Some people have a God-shaped void in their lives that gets filled with consumerism, celebrity 'demi-gods', far-left/far-right politics and conspiracy theories. It seems that Post-Truth is not only a modern phenomenon; lies and alternate truths have been pedalled throughout history. However, the way it is manifesting in our society is far more extensive than in previous times. Fake news/propaganda used to exist via print mediums, tv/cinema broadcasts or hearsay. George Orwell writes about Post-Truth in his dystopian novel '1984', but in many ways Post-Truth is now centre stage. However, more importantly than all this, the Bible constantly argues for the importance of truth.

Finally, the group looked at how Christians can navigate a Post-Truth world. We must check what we are told or read, use rationality rather than emotion, call out untruths, expect integrity from politicians, be honest with ourselves and be kind and listen to others, but remember to question things. Most importantly we must ask God for help and pray for world leaders. The Bible mentions truth many times. Gospel teaching can be summed up in John 4:24 God is spirit, and his worshippers must worship in Spirit and in truth."
