

Editorial

Dear Friends

When I was a child, May Day was a very exciting occasion for us at school. A May Queen would be chosen, and she would parade around the playground at school, closely followed by her attendants. And everyone wore flowers. I remember vividly that, at that time, my grandmother used to grow Pinks in her garden. So my mother would pick some of these and wrap them in a little bit of tin foil for me to carry as a posy. Whenever I smell the fragrance of these beautiful little flowers, I am immediately taken back to those childhood days, when life seemed so much simpler!

Once the parade was over, dressed in our finest clothes, we would all dance around the maypole. I can still see the gaily coloured ribbons intertwining at the top of the pole as I write this many years later. It was, as I remember it, a joyous day, as we celebrated the return of Summer.

May Day has been celebrated in the UK for many years. It was originally known as Beltane by the Celts, who celebrated the first day of summer with bonfires to welcome the new season. The day would be marked with fun and celebration in villages throughout the land.

However, because of its pagan roots the celebration was not popular with the church or state and in the Sixteenth Century it was banned. And dancing around the maypole did not return until the restoration of Charles II, who had a 40-metre maypole erected in London.

Still celebrated today in villages in England Jack in the Green sometimes makes an appearance, otherwise known as The Green Man, he is known as a symbol of fertility and the natural world. And Morris dancers perform the dances which have been part of our tradition for many years.

In Oxford on May Day morning, a celebration is held at the top of Magdalen College Tower by the singing of a Latin hymn or carol of thanksgiving. After this the College bells signal the start of Morris Dancing in the streets below. An interesting mixture of the sacred and secular.

For us in the church May begins with the third Sunday of Easter, and during the month we remember the apostles Philip, James and Matthias. The 26th May is Ascension Day, when we remember the day that our Lord returned to be with God the Father: many Christians greet this day with a sunrise service.

Whether you intend to greet the merry month with dancing and celebration, or in a slightly less exuberant way, I hope that May will find you looking forward to warmer weather and blue skies. In the Church's calendar we look towards the day of Pentecost on 5th June and the 'birthday' of God's church, when the mission of the Church to preach the Gospel to the whole world was made clear. The disciples were gathered together when "suddenly from Heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability". (Acts 2: 2-4) Now the disciples could be heard and understood by all those to whom they preached.

Over many years in Solihull, Fr. John made very many friends. He also presided over a number of funerals not only of friends but also a large number of Solihull Residents.

John was a great friend to all within the community; there were times that he seemed to know everyone in Solihull.



Major Works to the Windows and Stonework in St. Alphege Church

ollowing on from the drone survey in January (reported in the March edition of Parish News and referred to by the Parish Wardens and the Guardians), it is proposed to carry out major works to the windows and stonework in St Alphege Church.

In detail, the works will consist of:-

- Reroofing the North Porch
- Refurbishment of the Eighteenth Century North Porch Gates (they will be removed temporarily but, will be back!)
- Removal, refurbishment and reinstatement of the 10 leaded windows in the North and South elevations of the Bell Tower
- Removal, refurbishment and reinstatement of the Choir Vestry window, (not the tracery windows at the top)
- Removal, refurbishment and reinstatement of the 5 lower lancets (panels) at the base of the East window
- Removal and replacement of some eroded stone blocks on the south side of the church

The underlying reason for the works is due to deterioration over time by the weather and ageing of the materials, in a building, parts of which are over 800 years old. This deterioration has caused problems with the leading of the windows allowing movement, bowing to the glass and erosion of the stones and tiles.

On occasions, it may appear that no works are happening; this may be that the stoneworks have been completed, but that the refurbishment of the windows is continuing off site.

Pending approval of the project by the Diocese and various conservation organisations, it is anticipated the works will commence in May 2022 with completion by October 2022.

Worship Notes May 2022

his month continues the Easter season and includes many Festivals and other special occasions. The main liturgical colour is white apart from several important feast days where the colour is red.

Monday 2nd May

Today is the feast day of Saints Philip and James, Apostles.

Wednesday 4th May

The Feast Day of the English Saints & Martyrs of the Reformation Era. This day recalls those who witnessed to their Christian faith during the conflicts in church and state in England, which lasted from the 14th to the 17th centuries. We may also give thanks on this day that, in recent decades, ecumenical links have drawn churches of all denominations closer to each other in work and worship.

Sunday 8th May

The Feast of Mother Julian of Norwich who, when thirty years old and suffering from what was considered to be a terminal illness, experienced a series of sixteen visions, which revealed aspects of the love of God.

Saturday 14th May

The Feast Day of Matthias the Apostle. After the betrayal of Jesus by Judas Iscariot, the apostles brought their number back to twelve by choosing Matthias (by lot) to replace him.

Saturday 21st May

The Feast Day of Helena, Protector of the Holy Places, will be celebrated. Helena is the Patron Saint of St Helen's Church in our parish.

Thursday 26th May

Today is the Feast of the Ascension, forty days after Easter Day. Jesus commissions his disciples to continue his work, he promises the gift of the Holy Spirit, and then he is no longer among them in the flesh. The Ascension is therefore closely connected with the theme of mission. From this day, we look towards the arrival of the promised gift of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost later in the month.

Tuesday 31st May

The Church today recalls the visit of Mary to her cousin Elizabeth, when Mary sang her great hymn of praise (Luke 1:39-56)

he choirs are currently working extremely hard in the run-up to Holy Week and Easter – we hope that the music we offer enhances your worship. We have a busy rehearsal schedule, and a combination of new and well-known music, all chosen specially for the season and to fit the mood of each of the services. On Easter Day, there will be a combined Eucharist this year, and music will be offered by our choirs, organ and worship band during the service.

In this edition of Parish News, I'd particularly like to share information about two exciting new ventures, *Minims* and a *Jubilee Concert*.

After Easter, we will relaunch our programme for younger children, *Minims.*, See page 24. It will restart on Thursday 5th May in a slightly different format from previous years. Children aged five and six are invited to participate – they can attend any local school, or indeed be home-schooled. The format will be musical fun for 20 minutes, then they'll join the Junior Choristers for their warm-ups and one song or hymn, then it will be home time. Parents will be asked to stay with their child/children during the half-hour session. To make things more practical for parents, babes in arms will be welcome too – we know it's not always easy to make arrangements for younger siblings. Please do spread the word to any families you know who have children of this age who might be interested in attending or even just visiting us to see how they get on – they would be very welcome.

We have just received the amazing news that we have been successful in a bid for funding support for a *Platinum Jubilee* concert. The project will be supported by the Solihull Celebrating Communities Fund and one key aspect of our project is that we would like to give the opportunity to attend a concert to people who may not normally have access to this type of experience, or to those who are currently facing a difficult time. We will also be delighted to have our loyal supporters from across the parish in the audience. The concert will showcase music used at coronations, including specific music performed in Queen Elizabeth II's coronation, and the newly composed Queen's Platinum Jubilee Anthem, '*In our service'* by Thomas Hewitt-Jones.



Pioneer Diary

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart..." Proverbs 3:5 NIV

While pondering where to start, the verse that is the title of this article kept coming into mind. You see, my mind is currently full of questions. As I write we are still in Lent and I have facilitated four of the six planned sessions of *Wellbeing & Lent*, held at the Greville Arms. For those who measure success by figures, the course has been relatively well-attended – an average of eight people per week so far. And there has been a smattering of interest from non-Churchgoers. But I do wonder now if the venue choice was the best? That is to say, a couple of people in the last couple of weeks – one who comes along to *Wellbeing & Lent* and one who doesn't – have said things that have made me question the venue. However, at the same time, the staff and customers of the Greville Arms have made us very welcome; as well as commenting on the size of the group – "You must be doing something right" – and chatting with me about Lent. Plus, a member of the group told me only this week, "It's working, holding this here. If it wasn't, I wouldn't still be coming."

And yet still I am already thinking about venues, about next Lent, and about God's timing. Thus is the lot of the Pioneer. Let me expand:

While working as Pioneer ministers in the West of Bedford, my husband David and I set up *Tea & Talk* at the local community centre on the estate where we lived. *(This is in fact still running and we hope to visit them sometime this year.)* After *Tea & Talk* had been running for some time, Lent came around and we invited everyone from *Tea & Talk* and the local community to join us for a *Lent Lunch*. Each week we provided a simple lunch – bread, cheese, cold meats, cake – and there was a question to discuss over lunch, such *as "How do you feel when you hear the word, Church?"* or "*What does the word 'mother' mean to you?"* Two people from *Tea & Talk* joined us for the whole six weeks of Lent and some good discussion was had. *(Do not despise the day of small things. See Zechariah 4:10).*

By the next Lent *Tea & Talk* had moved rooms at the hall, to a room like the one in which we had run Lent Lunches the year before so, this time around, we ran *Lent Lunch* straight after *Tea & Talk*, in the same room. This time most of the group stayed and again, there was great discussion. In fact, most weeks, at some time during *Tea & Talk*, we would be asked "What question are we pondering today?" (*We would never tell!* ③) At the time I found myself questioning why we hadn't done that the year before, the take-up response being so much better. But now I can see that it was all about timing – we were a year further into our relationships with those people who stayed, and there is no guarantee that the take-up would have been the same a whole year before.

"...and lean not on your own understanding."

To bring us up to the present day, we must also consider God's timing in our 'people-made' plans. For instance:

Pioneer Diary

As a Pioneer I know that to get the best results from my ministry I must be secure in being myself. It is me and my interests, my personality, my gifts and talents, that God has called to this particular place at this particular time. (Just like he has called you to yours! Have a think about that. 0)

Those who know me know I love walking. Walking alongside someone is a good way to get to know them, and so I thought about planning some walks. Early in post here I led a number of walks around the local area over a couple of months but, although those who came along enjoyed the walks, the take-up was very low, and sometimes non-existent.

Fast-forward just over two years to today. *Wellbeing Wednesday* has been running for 46 weeks and, just recently, the people who come along have begun to talk about "going out for a walk". So, our first walk is planned for this coming Sunday (April 3rd). I already know that there are half-a-dozen people committed to this walk, and that is without the people who may just turn up on the day. *(It has been advertised more widely than the Wellbeing Wednesday group.)* Not only that, we have at least four people who cannot come this weekend but who are interested in when we might go out again, so today we have committed ourselves to, at the very least, a walk on the first Sunday of each month up until the first Sunday in October.

Same idea. Same me. Different time. God's timing.

All I can say is "trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding" − and watch this space! ^③



What is Living in Love & Faith?

Letter to the Parish from Fr. Andrew Hutchinson

Dear All

For the past 25 years I have served as Chaplain to Solihull School together with a congregation who use the School Chapel as their parish church. We have offered a variety of Sunday worship to accommodate the needs and backgrounds of our community ranging from Choral Evensong to circus services with Roly the priest clown, from Sung Mass to the infamous Pet Services for the blessing of our beloved animals.

I have been supported by an ecumenical team who have sustained the work of the Chaplaincy through practical help and prayer. Through various initiatives we discovered what it means to be a missionary church presenting a vision of how we have felt God calling us to be an inclusive community of hospitality. We developed the use of music, symbol, art, movement, space, colour and the use of the senses enjoying a considerable impact upon worship and mission. Over the years I have received a number of chaplaincy assistants. musicians ordinands and who have generously shared their own particular expertise.



A significant aspect of my work has been with the Solihull team of Anglican churches where, as an assistant priest I have been fully integrated into the mission, worship, organisation and pastoral care of the parish. It has been a particular delight and enormous privilege to celebrate the liturgies and preach regularly at St. Alphege Church. Both in school and in the parish I have prepared and celebrated services for the community including memorial services for staff, parents and pupils; leavers' liturgies; weddings; marriage blessings and a host of Prep. School services.

I have taken a number of school/parish pilgrimages including our annual visit to the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham, Norfolk; Santiago de Compostella; Rome; Assisi; Venice; Verona; the Holy Land and the Passion Play at Oberammergau. All these expeditions have provided opportunity for fun, fraternity and spiritual growth.

Sixth Form students have joined me on visits to Kenya where we experienced the Christian church ministering in areas of deprivation celebrating the faith with vibrancy and joy. We have also received African Bishops who have enhanced the life of our Chaplaincy. My own connections with the Ghanaian church, where I spent time teaching prior to ordination, have sustained my own life and ministry.

I have demonstrated my musical skills at the organ console from time to time and led worship at Birmingham Cathedral. During my time in Solihull I have relished joining our chapel choirs singing Cathedral evensong at St. Paul's, Lichfield, St. Albans, Worcester, Gloucester, and Windsor Chapel.

Throughout my time here people have been prepared for the Sacraments, invited to participate in Alpha courses, and played a part in the open 'Going for Growth' missionary programme.

Pastoral ministry in the school and parish have included counselling, bereavement care, hospital and home visits and general support for those facing difficulties in life. Community Service with Sixth Form pupils has enhanced our relationship as a school with the wider population of Solihull and enabled the elderly to attend services at Christmas and Harvest.

Whilst here I have worked diligently in preaching, enabling the faith to become real and accessible. Through my own visits to Iona and the Church of St. Gregory, San Francisco, we have incorporated aspects of their participative, affirming and inclusive ministry into our own liturgical and pastoral life. Together we have inspired others to participate fully in the Eucharist where everyone has been welcome, without exception, to receive the Sacrament opening the door for people to experience God's love often for the first time.

Through the seasons of Easter and Christmas we have celebrated our stories of liberation; calling out familiar and unexpected saints, proclaiming again and again that Christ is Born, Christ is Alive and Christ is Risen indeed!

Year after year we have opened our hearts and minds to those of other world faiths and of none celebrating the manifold gifts, backgrounds and experiences which upbuild the school community. Update from the Parish Wardens

When you read this, Lent and Easter will have passed and we give thanks for the opportunities to pray and study with the Lent Courses and Just Explore, and for the opportunities of many services and activities such as 'The Easter Journey'. Easter is such an uplifiting time and especially so with continuing Covid and the horrors in Ukraine.

Most of you will be aware of the good news that we can now move forward with the recruitment of a Priest-in-Charge (Rector Designate). The Diocese wishes to propose an alteration to the structure of the Parish and there are legal technicalities with this which will take many more months. So, the Bishop is 'suspending the living' which allows us now to recruit a Priest-in-Charge (Rector Designate) who will become Rector when the new structure is in place. We hope to advertise for the post in late April or early May.

We are continuing to review work with young people and younger adults and will shortly be moving forward on an appointment here too.

As reported last time, we will be having an Action Morning where we can set some priorities for our Transforming Church Action Plan (TCAP). It will be held on Saturday 14th May at St. Swithin's House, Barston, and we will report back on these priorities.

It is very pleasing that the Solihull Welcome for Refugees and Asylum Seekers has now started in the Oliver Bird Hall and has welcomed a good number of people to the sessions.

The Platinum Jubilee Celebrations will soon be upon us – please do keep thinking of ways we can celebrate this unique occasion. Pam is heading up a Flower Festival for the whole Parish for which help would be much appreciated. Other events are also planned, such as the Mothers' Union Tea Party and a Grand Concert by our church choirs, so do look out for details of those and please do support them.

Many of the events listed above, especially all the wonderful services which took place from Palm Sunday to Easter Day, could not have taken place without an enormous amount of work by our Clergy and Staff, and a huge number of very willing volunteers. We thank you all most sincerely for all that you have done and continue to do for us. Thank you too, to all those who represent us on our Parochial Church Council, District Church Councils and Deanery and Diocesan Synods; we offer a warm welcome to those who have just joined these Councils at the recent A.G.M.s.

Let us pray for the appointments of the right persons for our Priest in Charge and Youth/Young Adults Worker, and for the activities and services in the Parish so that we can see our life together with God flourishing.

In Spirit and in Truth (a reflection on John 4: 1-26)

On Easter Day this year our main celebration will be a combined communion and eucharist at 10.30. The music will be led by both the band and the choirs, with both traditional and modern hymns and songs. Father Andrew will be presiding at what will be his 'farewell' service, so we will give him the opportunity to sing the special chants gloriously as he always does. The choir, band and organ will combine in leading the Glastonbury Gloria and the worship song 'Led like a Lamb', and the choir will sing their newly-discovered Sanctus and Agnus for double choir by Hassler. So: All Ages and All Styles, and a congregation of Christian pilgrims who are there both to worship and to exercise the greatest gift: Charity.

Part 2: In Spirit and in Truth: Transformational Worship

So much for what matters to me, discussed in last month's article. Now – what matters to God?

'Oh, but we couldn't possibly presume to know that! Only fundamentalists claim to know what God thinks – we're Anglicans!'

Well consider this: how fundamental are we being when we express our views about certain unscrupulous people who have been convicted for banking irregularities? Does God agree with us?

I think you'll find He does in this instance! – since every Sunday in the Eucharist we ask Him to help us to do what he commanded: 'do justly and love mercy'. Where does this commonly quoted phrase come from?

Take a look at Micah, Amos, John's Gospel and the letter of James – and you'll find that you can't divorce transforming action in the world – the political and economic day-to-day – from the way we worship on Sunday.

Wherewith shall I come before the Lord, and bow myself before the high God? shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves of a year old? Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, or with ten thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my <u>soul</u>? He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God? (Micah 6 6-8)

... or is this what James is talking about when he talks about 'true religion'?

Pure religion and undefiled before God the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep [yourself] unspotted from the world. (James 1:26-27)

.... and what do we make of this?

I hate, I despise your feast days, and I will not smell your solemn assemblies. Though ye offer me burnt offerings and your meat offerings, I will not accept them: neither will I regard the peace offerings of your fat beasts. Take thou away from me the noise of thy songs; for I will not hear the melody of thy viols. But let judgment run down as waters, and righteousness as a mighty stream. (Amos 5: 21-24)

This might be the answer:

The woman saith unto him, Sir, I perceive that thou art a prophet. Our fathers worshipped in this mountain; and ye say, that in Jerusalem is the place where men ought to worship. Jesus saith unto her, Woman, believe me, the hour cometh, when ye shall neither in this mountain, nor yet at Jerusalem, worship the Father. Ye worship ye know not what: we know what we worship: for salvation is of the Jews. But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship him. God is a Spirit: and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth.

(John 4: 19-23 – our Lord's words to another Samaritan!)

Now something more recent:

'If worship is an engagement in divine mission, mission is an engagement in worship. Precisely because 'going to church' is not to be divorced from 'going to work' or 'keeping a household', as if these were separate and unrelated spheres of being and action, our Christian service outside the liturgy, our striving after justice, our performing acts of practical kindness, could all be called a 'liturgy after the liturgy', a way in which we worship. It then becomes an important function of the liturgy to make us more attentive and responsive to those around us, to help us to have what St Paul calls 'the mind of Christ', so that we can be sent out to express that mind of Christ in our attentive dealing with the needs of individuals and the pressing issues of our society. What unfolds in the drama of worship is lived out, and becomes the work of those called to be co-workers of Christ in actively promoting peace and human flourishing among the harsh and un-reconciled realities of the world.' (Transforming Worship: Living the New Creation - A Report by the Liturgical Commission; 2007)

So, what is the chief purpose of worship?

I'm sure that by now we've struck off 'to make us feel good' as a purpose.

Being uplifted, having our spiritual batteries re-charged, and good feelings - these might be some of the results of an hour in church on a Sunday, or of time spent 'alone with God' in our private devotions. But the words of our Lord, and of Amos, Micah and John the Evangelist, all point to transformation in our day-to-day lives as the main point of worship.

This could be seen as both the purpose of entering into worship, and the end result.

Warning: it may not make us feel good – as we might have a part of our lives, our family, our neighbourhood, or a world situation - highlighted in our consciousness that we'd rather not look at – or even which we came to church to get away from.

Conversely, if we enter into a time of worship not expecting our lives to be changed, then can we really claim to be 'worshipping in spirit and in truth'?



Matters of Faith

Afterlife

Responding to a query concerning the Bible's teaching about life after death, the Revd. Martin Tunnicliffe assembled these thoughts for consideration.

AFTERLIFE (Eternal life, Everlasting life)

There are hints of belief in an afterlife in the Old Testament, but there is no consistent teaching there.

Here are some Old Testament references.

Job 19:25-27 I know that my Redeemer lives, and that in the end he will stand upon the earth. And after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see God; I myself will see him with my own eyes, and not another. How my heart yearns within me!

Isaiah 26:19 But your dead will live; their bodies will rise. You, who dwell in the dust wake up and shout for joy. Your dew is like the dew of the morning; the earth will give birth to her dead.

Daniel 12:1-3: At that time Michael, the great prince who protects your people, will arise. There will be a time of distress such as has not happened from the beginning of nations until then. But at that time your people—everyone whose name is found written in the book— will be delivered. Multitudes who sleep in the dust of the earth will awake: some to everlasting life, others to shame and everlasting contempt. Those who are wise will shine like the brightness of the heavens, and those who lead many to righteousness, like the stars for ever and ever.

Psalm 49: 13-15

This is the fate of those who trust in themselves, and of their followers, who approve their sayings.

- 14 They are like sheep and are destined to die; death will be their shepherd
- ...Their forms will decay in the grave, far from their princely mansions.
- 15 But God will redeem me from the realm of the dead; he will surely take me to himself.

Psalm 73.24

You guide me with your counsel, and afterward you will take me into glory."

2 Kings 2.11

As they were walking along and talking together, suddenly a chariot of fire and horses of fire appeared and separated the two of them, and Elijah went up to heaven in a whirlwind.

SHEOL. A word used in the Old Testament for "grave" or "underworld". The general feeling seems to be pessimistic and imprecise. *She'ol* in the Hebrew Bible is a place of darkness to which all the dead go, both the righteous and the unrighteous, regardless of the moral choices made in life, a place of stillness and darkness cut off from life and separated from God.

Jewish and Christian faith and tradition seem to agree that God is eternal, without beginning or ending, existing outside time. Time is part of God's creation.

At the time of Jesus, some Jews believed in resurrection, for example the Pharisees, while others, like the Saducees did not: see **Matthew 22.23-32**. Jesus and First Century Christians tended to side with the Pharisees, which is hardly surprising considering the Easter event.

Setting aside the rather specialist kind of writing, Apocalyptic, in **Mark 13** and the **Book of Revelation**, early Christian faith and teaching seemed to prefer to remain imprecise about the afterlife. The words of the Creeds referring to the "resurrection of the body" are to be interpreted as following the teaching of Saint Paul in **1 Corinthians 15. 36-44** about "a spiritual body." (see also Luke 23.43).

This contrasts with the Matthew version of the Easter story in **Matthew 27.50-53** which echoes what some first century Jews believed about resurrection being physical re-animation.

In the end, it is a matter of speculation for all of us. The Bible gives no clear blueprint about eternity, everlasting life, or afterlife. But it does give VERY clear teaching about the Love of God. We can therefore confidently have faith that, as Mother Julian put it so strongly, "all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well" not only in this life, but supremely in whatever is to come afterwards.

Any **CHRISTIAN** discussion about life after death must surely take account of the statement "God is Love".
