Editorial

I recently came across a video titled 'The world's remotest place of worship'. The video revealed a church located in the Tigray Region of Ethiopia which is carved into the side of a cliff and which can only be reached by a strenuous and dangerous two-hour climb of 1000 feet. The church, named *Abuna Yemata Guh*, is believed to have been hewn from the rock during the Sixth Century. It is dedicated to Abuna Yemata, one of the nine saints of Ethiopia and is notable for its dome and wall paintings dating back to the Fifteenth Century.

Despite the extreme challenge involved in reaching Abuna Yemata Guh, the church is used daily and about 80 worshippers attend the Sunday service, including pregnant women, elderly people and mothers with their children on their back! The current priest of *Abuna Yemata Guh*, Father Assefa, who is nearly 70 years old, has climbed to the church every day for over 50 years.

This hazardous journey of faith is what we might call a spiritual practice: an activity done on a regular basis to help us to further our spiritual development and growth and to deepen our connection to God.

But we don't have to go to such extremes in order to deepen our relationship with God. A spiritual practice doesn't have to be hard - it simply requires a willingness to begin and then a commitment to keep trying.

We may already be doing some of this by attending church regularly, reading the Bible, and spending time in prayer. These are important elements of the Christian faith which have sustained and guided millions of people down the ages. They support and build up the community of Christian believers, enabling us to worship God and to serve the local community.

Alongside these important activities there are many other areas of the Christian tradition which can help us to develop spiritually. These are timeless traditions of prayer and contemplation, of action and reflection, which can help us to flourish as followers of Jesus. The beauty of these traditions is that they appeal to each of us in different ways and involve the use of our mind, our heart and our senses, so that we can grow as the unique person that God created us to be. This is what many call 'developing our spiritual practice'.

A couple of months ago, I wrote about a new parish-wide project which will offer us the opportunity to develop our spiritual practice. This will take the form of a series of events, groups and classes which will focus on a variety of practices of prayer, spiritual learning and exploration.

We are going to begin his project by offering two opportunities to develop our spiritual practice through the season of Advent:

- 1. **An Advent Quiet Morning** on Saturday 23rd November. This will be led by Suzette Maguire at St. Alphege Church from 9.30 a.m. for a 10am start, until 12.30 p.m. There is an invitation to a 'bring and stay lunch' straight afterwards. Further details about booking for this event will be available in all our churches.
- 2. **The Art of Advent**: we will explore some of the world's greatest paintings to discover the spiritual message within them. Come and journey through Advent as we allow great works of art to lead us deeper into prayer. This will take place at St Michael's Chapel from 1.45 p.m. -3.00 p.m., starting on Wednesday 27th November and then continuing on Wednesdays 4th, 11th and 18th December. I hope that you may be able to take part in one (or both!) of these events. If not, please don't worry, as there will be plenty more opportunities for spiritual practice in 2025!

Heritage Day Tower Tours

The Ringers were really grateful to be asked to get involved in the Heritage Day. So, a big thank you to Pam and her volunteers who did the organising and took the tower tour bookings. And, a big thank you too, to the ringers that gave up their time to safely see something like fifty visitors all the way up the tower and back. It is a fair way to the belfry where the bells are, nearly one hundred steps in all. We had one lady who felt a little faint, but all was well and there were lots of reminders about taking time on our uneven and unfamiliar spiral steps. It was all worthwhile.

So, what did they see? Well, we started in the church under the tower, looking at the door that leads to the base of the spiral staircase. We last used the door in May when we celebrated Bell Sunday and the bell ringers processed into church straight from ringing, to attend the service. Normally we use the external door. Looking up, they saw the blocked-up doorway that would once have taken you out on to St. George's Loft. Originally a chapel converted to ringing room and choir loft, a wooden structure that would have sat on the capitals under the tower. We also looked up to the embossed tower ceiling and the hexagonal panel that

can be winched out to allow the bells to come in and out. The last time being when the newest bell was installed in 1996. Of course, we also saw the rope for the *Sanctus* bell which can be connected to the rope upstairs to allow it to be chimed from the church, when the *Sanctus* ("Holy, Holy, Holy") is said

or sung during Communion.

We were blessed with fine weather, so we walked our tours through the choir vestry, once St. Mary's Chapel, and into the graveyard where we stood looking up at the tower. We pointed out the windows and the levels we would be climbing to and noted the change in colour of the stone, the top grey section of the tower being added in 1470. Looking on up to the spire that has twice fallen and been rebuilt, now slightly shorter than the original, with the weathervane sitting some 600 feet above sea level.

We then made our way to the ringing room, passed the blocked-up door to St. Georges loft and noting the wide windowsills on the stairs which become much smaller as the tower walls become thinner on the way up. In the ringing room we could track the rope for the *Sanctus* bell and see how it could be connected to our rope upstairs. We had the cupboard door in the paneling open so that people could see where the original windows were for the tower, now covered by the transepts, nave and chancel. Our visitors peered into the gloom of the pendulum cupboard to see and hear our gorgeous clock pendulum gently swaying back and forth. The clock mechanism was once on a balcony reached by ladder from the ringing room. Now there is a complete floor which has some soundproofing but is still accessed by ladder.

We gave a brief overview of bellringing, and the visitors watched the *Sanctus* bell being rung. Then it was onwards and upwards to the belfry, pointing out another blocked-up doorway which would once have been the belfry entrance. You can peer through a remaining window in it into what is now the clock room. We reach the top of the stairs which hundreds of

years ago would have gone on and up onto the roof of the tower. Huddled in the belfry looking across our thirteen beautiful bells, we rang the *Sanctus* bell again, while they watched on, completing the rope's journey from the church floor below. They were fascinated with the ladder leading into the base of the spire but I'm afraid it really would have been unsafe to take them on any further and onto the battlements.

We went back to the ringing room, spotting various graffiti carved initials in the sandstone, most of it dating back well over a hundred years. Once back in the ringing room, there was a little time for some questions and talk of the occasions we ring for and, a mention of some of our more notable ringers. It was then time to show our visitors back down the stairs and await the next group.

We received some great feedback so perhaps we'll get involved again. Until then we look forward to greeting a scout group, our own Youth Group and even a young archaeologists' group. See, we keep busy and keep enjoying both showing

the bells and explaining the art of ringing to anyone who visits us.

James Brews a Special St. Alphege Beer

n Tuesday 8th October James, a Bass in the St. Alphege Choir, headed to Stirchley to meet friends of St. Alphege Beer Festival, Birmingham Brewing Co., on a special mission to brew a one-off beer for our Beer Festival. This is the first time a beer has been brewed directly for us. Exciting times!!

James writes -

Chris (from Birmingham Brewing) was given the task of leading the brew day and he quickly put me to work mashing in, where grain is mixed with water to form a porridge-like mixture called the mash. As this was only to be a small batch, we were using the pilot kit which should make around 50L, as opposed to 3000L on the big kit!

Mashing in completed, we left the grain to work its magic before we could begin the



temperature for the yeast, but also in our case, as the fermenting tank we were to use is made of plastic, and we didn't want any off-flavours being created by a warm vessel.

Once the fermenting vessel was full, we pitched the yeast, and our work for the day was finished. The fermentor was put to bed to allow the yeast to do its work, eating up the sugars and creating alcohol. Fingers crossed we will have a fantastic beer which can only be



sparging process, which is where we rinse the grain bed with hot water to help release the sugars in the grain. Once we were happy that we'd got as much of the sugars out of the grain as possible, the process of transferring the wort (the liquid produced from the mash) to the copper began. As the temperature got to the boil, we added the wonderfully smelling Mosaic and Ekuanot hops.

Boil done and it was ready to transfer to a fermentor via a heat exchange pump. This cools the wort quickly, mainly to the right

The recipe for the beer was kindly provided by Joe, Head Brewer at Marble Brewery in Manchester. It is going to be a Pale/IPA style of beer, based loosely on their beer Lagonda, the name changing to Gondola after a customer at the Marble Arch who reviewed the beer and mistakenly called it Gondola ... with the number of canals in Birmingham we couldn't help but name our beer Brummie Gondola! Full details will be in the Festival programme and once again, can only be sampled at the St. Alphege Beer Festival.

Thanks to everyone at Birmingham Brewing for their hospitality, time and support in creating a new beer, particularly to Chris and Griff.

The Beer List (Cask and Keg) for the Beer Festival is now really taking shape and I'm happy to confirm that we will have beer from some of the best breweries in the country, both local and a little further afield, including Church End, Fixed Wheel, Twisted Barrel, Elusive, Siren, The Kernel and many more.

Please come and join us on 1^{st} and 2^{nd} November at the Oliver Bird Hall to have a great time and raise funds for the Friends of St. Alphege Music.

Worship Notes for November 2024

The Feast of All Saints, on 1st November, marks the beginning of what has come to be informally named the Kingdom Season. The four Sundays which make up the season are a continuation of 'ordinary time' and used to be part of a series of nine Sundays before Advent. The Church's Year draws to its close with the Feast of Christ the King. The liturgical colour for the season is red or green.

Friday 1st November - All Saints' Day

Taizé Eucharist at St. Alphege, 7.30 p.m. All Saints' Day celebrates those in whose lives the Church has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is a time to be encouraged by the example of the saints and to recall that holiness can grow in the ordinary circumstances of human life, as well as in the extraordinary events.

Saturday 2nd November - All Souls' Day

Also known as The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed, this day celebrates the saints in a more local and intimate way. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more directly: those who gave us life, or who nurtured us in faith.

Sunday 3rd November

All Souls' Commemoration Service at St. Alphege, 5pm. At this service we will remember those whom we have known personally who have died.

Sunday 10th November - Remembrance Sunday

Today a new year begins in the life of the Church. Advent is a season of expectation and preparation, as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming (*adventus*) of Christ in his incarnation, and also looks ahead to his final advent as judge at the end of time.



A new look for St. Helen's

Pioneer Diary

Advent: Journeying Together

Advent Book

The Archbishop of York's Advent book for this year, written by Rachel Mann, is called, "Do not be afraid: The joy of waiting in a time of fear".

The book comes out in September, but the blurb that precedes it tells us:

'Waiting can be beautiful and, at least sometimes, it takes us to the heart of the Holy.'

As much at home with Strictly Come Dancing as the mystical writings of Julian of Norwich, Rachel Mann writes with disarming verve of something we all experience - waiting.

It may seem unlikely when you're stuck on a train, or nervously anticipating hospital treatment, or simply fearful of an uncertain future, that there is treasure to be found in the waiting. Yet the Psalmist says, 'I waited patiently for the Lord; he inclined to me and heard my cry.'

These luminous meditations tell stories of God waiting with us when we're in fear or distress; of coming - bidden or unbidden - to relieve our loneliness; of disconcerting us, desiring us and surprising us with joy. Most of all they remind us that Jesus Christ comes into the world as one long waited for; as the servant who waits on others; as the one on whom we are, adoringly, called to wait.

Covering 4 weeks, each meditation ends with a prayer and questions for reflection, which may be used by individuals or groups.

Each of the 'Sacred Space' sessions will last for around 55 minutes, and this is either space to reflect on what has been shared in the (short) input, and how it reflects on your life, or to simply spend the time with God however you wish. Activity sheets are provided, linked to each session of input, for those who would like a little more direction, but these are purely optional.

Pioneer Diary

As Susan Sayers writes in her Advent book (2006), 'Making Christmas Happen', "this Advent let's stand back from all of the pre-Christmas frenzy of expectation a moment and catch our breath and regain our balance."

The Advent Journey: "Why bother?"

As I write I have just returned from sabbatical, during which I experienced a labyrinth retreat. Unlike a maze, where you can hit a dead end and get lost, the journey through a labyrinth is a winding journey into the centre, where you can spend as much time waiting upon God as you need, before undertaking the same winding journey back out again. This winding journey is symbolic of life and, in this instance, I would suggest is symbolic of the journey through Advent too.

I had an amazing time with God during my sabbatical, and with my fellow retreatants on the labyrinth retreat, and the one word I would share with you now with regard to that amazing time is – 'perspective'.

Growing up I used to love the TV programme, 'Ask the Family', with Robert Robinson. Very often on there they used to show you a picture of something very close up and ask you to identify what it was. Sometimes the families were able to recognise the object, and sometimes they weren't, because the perspective was changed. (For another example of this, try putting your hand right up to your face and seeing what is beyond it – it will be blurred at best.)

Just like with those pictures (or with your hand if you tried it), the busyness of life can cause any of us to lose perspective at any time. We may be busy with our job, or with our families, or a myriad of other valuable things – even with doing things for God – and it's easy to lose perspective and not realise that this has happened. It just becomes 'the way it is'.

I would suggest that keeping Advent in some way – that is, in *intentionally* journeying with Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem - we put ourselves in a position where we can regain some of that lost perspective.

So, whether you join in with looking at the Advent book, with the Advent Quiet morning, or you do something else that suits *your* spirituality, my prayer for us all is that we have an *intentional* Advent with our loving God at the centre, and that, when we reach our Christmas celebrations, our perspective will be more Christ-centred than it was.

Think and pray -

Here I offer you, Lord Jesus, All my preparations for Christmas. Teach me more about giving And more about receiving. Realign my priorities In tune with your will, And enable me to see more clearly How best to celebrate your coming As our Lord and Saviour. Amen.

The Goodness of God

uring the year Birmingham City Mission started (1966), Birmingham's BT tower was completed. It has stood as the city's highest landmark at a height of 152 metres. Very soon it will be superseded by another building. In the summer of 2025, it is expected that the Octagon, the world's first octagonal high rise residential building, will be completed and become our city's tallest building at 155 metres. Costing £110 million, the Octagon will include 370 one, two, and three-bedroom apartments, affordable homes, communal space and residents' amenities. It will stand out on the city's skyline as people pass by, travelling along the M6 motorway.

I must confess that I have enjoyed seeing landmarks in places I have visited over the years, small or large. Glenfinnan Monument in Scotland was built in memory of 1,200 Highlanders who gathered eight months before the Battle of Culloden. Standing in front of the monument one can just imagine the noise and excitement of those men all those years ago. I have photographs which I took from the top of one of the Twin Towers in New York from 1994 during dusk, as the lights of the city were turned on. Now of course, they remind me of the terrible events of 9/11.

If it were possible, the monument that I would love to photograph, is the one that Joshua built on the riverbed of the river Jordan. He led the Israelites across the river in the spring when the water depth was probably higher than normal. As the priests entered the water, God caused the river to be held upstream allowing the Israelites to cross into the Promised Land on dry ground. God instructed Joshua to use twelve stones representing the twelve tribes and to erect a monument on the riverbed where the priest had stood. A similar monument was built at Gilgal. Joshua told the people, "In the future, when your descendants ask their fathers, "What are these stones?" tell them, "Israel crossed the Jordan on dry land. For the Lord your God dried up the Jordan until you crossed over." I can imagine parents standing with their children years later in Gilgal explaining to them what the stones represented!

As we go through life, whether with our families, churches, or Christian organisations, there are always good times and challenging times. Periods when it feels like that everything is going well and that we can see and feel the blessing of God, and others when, out of the blue just like a tsunami, we are confronted with unexpected and unpredictable challenges.

During the harder times we may not have a monument like the one that Joshua built to visit and reflect upon, but I think it is good to remember the times when God was with us and delivered us through some crisis or another, or brought us through some difficulty, or provided for us in a miraculous way. Perhaps making a note of answered prayers and of the 'God interventions' that we have experienced will in practice become our personal Gilgal as we remind ourselves of God's goodness.

We have a God who can do exceedingly abundantly above all that we can ask or even imagine. Please pray that we may see His power at work in us and through us this month.





Matters of Faith

Do You Believe in Angels?

The Revd. Martin Tunnicliffe responds to a local churchgoer's guestion.

Question

I have always believed in the existence of Guardian Angels, but recently I met two clergy who say that they don't advocate that belief in the Anglican Church as there is no reference to them in the Bible.

Response

I think it's fair to say that, in Bible times, everyone believed in supernatural beings, whether angels, or pagan gods. I'm no expert on the subject, but I should think that, with few exceptions, this belief continued worldwide until the (so-called) Age of Enlightenment. This is a title sometimes given to a time of radical questioning which came about in Europe and America during the Eighteenth Century.

The ancient Greeks and Romans had their 'gods' who were generally thought to exist at a reasonably safe distance on top of Mount Olympus in Greece (see Acts 14.11). At the same time, the Middle Eastern countries believed in supernatural beings of various kinds with varying degrees of influence and power. The traditional Jewish faith stoutly and uniquely maintained the concept of *JHWH* as the one and only supreme God, creator and sustainer of all that exists. The Jewish religion appears to have adopted from Persian theology the idea of supernatural subordinate spiritual beings existing closer to God than humans do, dwelling with him in a heavenly realm above. Christianity inherited this belief, along with much else from the Jewish religion (see the Apocalypse of John, i.e. Revelation, the final book in the New Testament).

We get our word "angel" from the Greek word "angelos" which means messenger. So, in Judaism and Christianity, the heavenly system of governance is held to be like the human system, with a supreme authority (king) who communicates with his subjects by sending messengers. I think that the idea of angels as guardians must derive from the saying of Jesus (uniquely in Matthew 18.10) which was prompted by his blessing of little children: See that you do not despise one of these little ones. For I tell you that their angels in heaven always see the face of my Father in heaven.

For myself, I strongly believe in the existence of angels. For example: in my driving days, I used to dread the approach to the roundabout at the Robin Hood traffic island on the Stratford Road. The nearer I got to it, the more urgently I prayed, and imagined the whole area being overlooked by angels, who saw to it that there were not frequent and multiple crashes. I also consider that God occasionally sends his angels in human form, and often singly. My strongest personal experience of this I have written down as an essay entitled "The Lord's Angel."

I Stand Alone

I stand alone but He is near me.
I cannot speak but He can hear me.
A thousand years His gift is with us.
If we can trust, then He can save us.
All troubles fade when we are with Him.
New life begins when we believe Him.
Love Him and live.

What must I do to receive Him?
Just turn and see, and then believe Him.
Follow His path up to the Hill
Then stand, give thanks
And do His will.
All those who try know they will fail
But still in hope they try again.
Do not give in

His hand will guide. In deepest darkness
He is the light that does not dim,
His is the love that does not fail.
Keep on His path,
And walk with those who know the way.
Where shall I find such friends as these?
Just look around and you will see
The kindly hand offered on the way,
The gentle smile when grief descends,
The Being there, when all else fails.
Oh Gentle Lord, what thanks are there
To say enough for all thy care?
