Editorial

few days ago, I received a card in the mail from my daughter. On the front of the card was a lovely watercolour drawing of a blackbird, my favourite garden bird.

Blackbirds are one of our most familiar British birds, and have learned to thrive alongside humans in both rural and urban settings. At this time of year, the blackbird's beautiful, melodic song can be widely heard, especially at the opening and closing of the day.

On 3rd June, the Church celebrates the feast of St. Kevin, who lived from 498-618 and was a hermit at Glendalough in Ireland. A group of disciples gathered around him and a monastery grew up there. He is said to have lived to be 120 years old! One much-loved story about Kevin of Glendalough tells of a blackbird building its nest in his outstretched hands as he was praying. He kept perfectly still until the eggs hatched. Regardless of whether this story is true or not, it paints a beautiful word-picture of his spirituality. Concern for the natural world and all its creatures is a hallmark of Celtic Christian spirituality.

The late Seamus Heaney explored this tale in his poem *St. Kevin and the Blackbird*. He describes the moment when the blackbird chose to settle on St. Kevin's hand:

... The saint is kneeling, arms stretched out, inside His cell, but the cell is narrow, so

One turned-up palm is out the window, stiff As a crossbeam, when a blackbird lands And lays in it and settles down to nest.

In compassion St. Kevin remains still and silent for the weeks it takes for the eggs to hatch and the fledglings to fly away:

... now he must hold his hand Like a branch out in the sun and rain for weeks Until the young are hatched and fledged and flown.

We might think St. Kevin foolish to give himself entirely to this task which, otherwise, would not concern him. How could he think it worthwhile to give up weeks of his life to this one task for which he will not be rewarded or thanked? Is one small creature and its offspring deserving of such sacrifice?

St. Kevin clearly thinks so. Indeed, he seems not to give his task much thought at all, but simply undertakes it in his role as a servant of the God of all creation. Heaney's poem continues:

'To labour and not to seek reward,' he prays,

A prayer his body makes entirely For he has forgotten self, forgotten bird And on the riverbank forgotten the river's name.

'To labour and not to seek reward,' he prays to Christ, who said, "Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor" (Mark 10:21), and whose unworldly challenge is reinforced by St. Paul, who urges Christ's followers to 'offer your bodies as a living sacrifice' (Romans 12:1).

This story of St. Kevin gives us an image of those who hold the helpless and vulnerable in a strong embrace: those who tend the sick in hospital or at home; those who search tirelessly

for survivors of natural disasters or missile strikes; those who bring water, food and medicine to those in war zones.

They choose to endure and to forget whatever might weaken that embrace, until they can lay their burdens safely down. Like Kevin of Glendalough, their outstretched hand offers a small space of security and hope.

May we be so devoted to our worship of our Creator, that we may respect and cherish all God has created.

The Bragg Family of Bell Ringers

S and Cooper, who writes most of these Parish Magazine articles about the bellringers, referred in her last one to families of ringers. I'd like to expand on one of these families as they were so important to the history of bell ringing in Solihull.

Sand and I both attended the Guardians' event "Light and Sound at St. Alphege Church" recently to talk about the bells. She dealt mainly with how bellringing works, including a demonstration on handbells using "volunteers" from the audience. I spoke about the forty-year period from 1891 to 1932, at the beginning and end of which two major overhauls of the bells took place and included some details of some of the ringers of the period.




One family I referred to were the Braggs. Sand mentioned in her article that there had been six Braggs who rang at Solihull. This was taken from a list of members which she compiled based on

the Minutes Book. But in other research I've discovered three more Braggs who were not documented as members of the guild but who definitely rang here.

Who were these nine Braggs? The wider family would have been well-known in the village of Solihull in the 1890s. We know that different branches of the family were builders, bakers, butchers, funeral directors and more.

The first Bragg we know of who rang in Solihull was John Bragg (1844-1917). As far as we know, he stopped ringing before the local Guild was set up in 1891 so he was never elected





as a member. But two of his sons, John A. and Archer took it up. And two of John Bragg Senior's non-ringing brothers (Samuel and Charles) each had sons who joined in — Samuel and George (sons of Samuel) and Stanley, Roland and Harry (sons of Charles). The final ringer called Bragg that we're aware of is Charles W. from the next generation down. Oddly, he's not the son of one of the seven of the previous generation who rang, but of an older brother of Stanley, Roland and Harry.

You can see the problem of understanding the family tree when there are multiple Johns, Samuels and Charles! There's a tantalising hint that others of John Senior's generation also rang, but I haven't been able to find any evidence of who they are (yet!).

The Braggs were not just ringers but took up important roles in the Guild. Roland was our Ringing Master from 1935 to 1953 and no fewer than three others (Samuel, Stanley and John A.) were successively Tower Keeper from 1906 to 1961!

The earliest dated ringing by a Bragg in Solihull is 1896 and we continued to benefit from at least one of them until as recently as 1969. On several occasions seven of them rang together in a band of ten.

John A. (elected 1897), Samuel (1897), Stanley (1899), Roland (1902), Harry (1920) and Charles W. (1945) are the six members Sand identified. In addition to John Senior, mentioned above, there is no evidence that George and Archer were ever elected to the Guild. George's ringing career was quite short (two quarter peals in 1907) so perhaps he never was. But Archer rang here from 1907 to 1945. However, only one minuted meeting took place between 1906 and 1935 so I suspect he was a member but that we just don't have the evidence to prove it.

Guild members or not, it's no exaggeration to say that between them, the Bragg family sustained bell ringing in Solihull for decades and that we would have been much worse off without them.

Worship Notes for June 2025

June is a month of transition from Eastertide to the Season of Pentecost – sometimes unhelpfully known as Ordinary Time and counted, week by week, by how many Sundays it is after Trinity.

The first Sunday in June (1st June) is the seventh and final week of Easter, also known as the Sunday after Ascension. It is a Sunday dedicated to the invocation of the Holy Spirit encapsulated in the Collect:

O God the King of glory, you have exalted your only Son Jesus Christ with great triumph to your kingdom in heaven: we beseech you, leave us not comfortless, But send your Holy Spirit to strengthen us and exalt us to the place where our Saviour Christ is gone before, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

The following Sunday (8th June) we celebrate Christ's gift of his Holy Spirit upon the disciples at Pentecost, a Jewish harvest festival, which explains why it was such an international crowd. This important day is marked by the liturgical colour red, reminding us that the Holy Spirit appeared as flames resting upon each of the disciples. Its alternate name of Whit (White) Sunday is due to the tradition of conducting baptisms and confirmations on this day with the candidates attired in white.

Another important feast day, Trinity Sunday, falls the following week (15^{th} June) – a day famed for lay preaching as clergy choose to delegate the task of explaining how God is both one and three! On this Sunday we return one final time to the celebratory colour of white or gold before the long green season begins. This Season of Pentecost will run until the end of October and doubtless more on that next month.

Other important feast days within the month of June include Corpus Christi (the Day of Thanksgiving for Holy Communion) on the 19th and the feast of Peter and Paul, Apostles, on the 29th, this year falling on a Sunday.

Aside from the various dedications and feast days, we also look forward to welcoming some guest preachers in the month of June. Speakers from Compassion UK will visit each of our district churches to talk about their work transforming lives through child sponsorship. And on 29th June our Area Dean, the Revd. Tony Rindl, will visit St. Helen's.

There was a lot going on at St. Helen's in the week leading up to Easter. We delivered cards to all those in St. Helen's Road and to some of our other neighbours. There were two services in our chapel: Maundy Thursday Communion with foot washing, taken by Roger, and a Tenebrae service (a moving service which has been held in St. Helen's chapel for many years) on Good Friday evening, taken by Nick. We had several visitors joining us for our Easter morning service, as well as a viola and a flute accompanying our worship. An

empty wooden cross was at the front of the church all week and after the morning service we served refreshments (including mini eggs) outside for everyone, and a number of those who live in St Helen's Road joined us to put flowers on the empty cross.

These groups continue to meet fortnightly using different study guides and are an important part of our fellowship, providing pastoral care as well as the valuable learning and



discussing and praying together which we all find so important for our faith.

In May we look forward to welcoming 2 visitors at our morning services. Bishop Maurice Sinclair will be with us to speak and lead our Communion Service on 11^{th} May. After years of mission service in South America, Bishop Maurice was Principal of Crowther Hall CMS College in Selly Oak, then Bishop of Northern Argentina & Primate of Southern Cone and is now retired. Pioneer Diary

A Gift

onfession time. I really like the Richard Osman programme "House of Games". I have several favourites among the rounds that they play: I absolutely love 'answer-smash', and a close second favourite is a round entitled "And the answer isn't." In that round, there is one question with four answers. One of the answers is the correct one, but the other three answers have been written by the fellow contestants alongside the person answering the question. (There are shades of 'Call My Bluff', which was another favourite some years ago.)

It is amazing sometimes how we are told a definition of something and we're as certain as we can be that that is correct – until we hear the next one and then we begin to doubt; and then we hear the next one and so on, *ad infinitum*.

So, where am I going with this?

Well, if I were to say to you the phrase 'ordinary time', would you know what I meant? If you didn't, or you were unsure, you might look at the word ordinary and assume you know what it meant. So, play along with me please: "Ordinary" in this instance means what?

- A) Commonplace; with no special or distinctive features.
- B) Ordinal numbers (to name and count the Sundays).
- C) Outside of the regular Christian church seasons.
- D) A time to rest.

If you said (B), well done! This is where the word ordinary comes from in this instance, the phrase ordinary time. If you said (C), then you're in the right area too – well done. And if you said (A) or (D), then don't worry, in my experience you have a lot of company. (Hence the motivation behind this article.)

So, ordinary time is called 'ordinary' not because it is commonplace or unimportant, but simply because the weeks of ordinary time are numbered. (From the Latin word "oridinalis", meaning 'order'.)

Ordinary time falls outside of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter, the more easily recognisable seasons during the Christian year. So, play along with me please: how many of the 52 weeks of the year fall into ordinary time?

- A) 33 or 34
- B) 23 or 24
- C) 43 or 44
- D) 13 or 14

If you said (A), well done! Ordinary Time falls on either 33 or 34 Sundays per year – that's over half of the year! – so what are we meant to do about it?

Well, during Ordinary Time we celebrate "the complete mystery of Christ", and we do this in order to be fed and to grow more Christlike ourselves. We are reminded of these things in

the symbols linked with ordinary time – Green, for hope, life and growth; and the loaves and fishes, for a deepening of our faith through a season of spiritual nourishment.

It strikes me too, as a wellbeing practitioner, that ordinary time is very much about being in the moment. Not collapsing in a heap as we recover from Christmas or Easter; or relishing the time to get well prepared for Christmas and Easter 'because there's not much else going on'; but focussing on Christ in the 'here and now'.

So, my challenge to us all is, What is each of us going to do when ordinary time begins on 16th June (until the Saturday before the first Sunday in Advent)? How are we going to attempt to deepen our faith? What will we do to enable us to be in a place for potential growth? Maybe you'd like to spend some time pondering those questions, and more.

As things stand at the moment, (it's 2nd May as I write), I hope to run a Quiet Evening, 6 p.m. for 6.30 p.m. until 9 p.m. on a weekday evening around June/ July, while we still have the light evenings. In this way, those who work during the day may be able to come along for the first time. Do register your interest with me and keep a look out for further details nearer the time.

Finally, do pray with me:

God, I appreciate the extra effort and energy we pour into our Holy Days. I love when the sanctuary is fuller than usual. I love the banners and flowers and special music. And, God, I love ordinary days like today. Days when we bring our best to worship you in the regular part of the church year. Days like today remind me how much of our life is spent in ordinary time. We go to work. We go to school. We wish it was the weekend or vacation or any day but today. God, give us the courage to live in the now. Help us to live into the ordinary days of our lives and of the church year. Remind us again that this day is a gift from you in all its ordinariness. For this day, we give you thanks, Gracious God, because you gave us another day to love you and to love each other. On this ordinary day in ordinary time, we will worship you, Loving God. Amen.



News from the Wider Church

n 21st April, 2025, the world learned of the death of His Holiness Pope Francis. People of many different faith traditions - and those who profess to have no religious faith - have paid tribute to Francis and his ministry as leader of the Roman Catholic Church.

The Archbishop of York issued a statement which included the following words:

"'Let us walk together, work together, pray together.' These are the words Pope Francis said to me when we met in 2023. They sum up his vision for the church, both the Roman Catholic Church but also ecumenically.

Francis's whole life and ministry was centred on Jesus who comes among us not to be served, but to serve. We saw that compellingly in Francis's service of the poor, his love of neighbour especially the displaced, the migrant, the asylum seeker, his deep compassion for the well-being of the earth and his desire to lead and build the church in new ways. Francis showed us how to follow Jesus and encouraged us to go and do likewise."

The Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, Rt. Revd. Dr. Shaw Paterson, included these words in his statement about Pope Francis:

"In recalling his contribution to Christian witness, we hear renewed the call made by His Holiness in *Laudato* to care for the earth as our common home, and in *Fratelli tutti* to discover the presence of Christ in each human being. We join with all Christian people in the prayer of Pope Francis:

Grant that we Christians may live the Gospel, discovering Christ in each human being, recognizing him crucified in the sufferings of the abandoned and forgotten of our world, and risen in each brother or sister who makes a new start. Amen."

May we look to the example of Pope Francis and, in so doing, learn to follow Christ more closely and faithfully.

time. Have a word with one of your wardens or get in touch with Stephen Linstead.



Matters of Faith

Do You Love Me?

A fter His resurrection Jesus met with Peter by the lakeside. His words were not of condemnation for Peter's betrayal but a simple question

"Do you love me?"

It is a good question for us all to ponder concerning our relationship with Jesus. Do I love Him? How do I know that I love Him and I do I show that I love Him?

There is a song in the musical Jesus Christ Superstar which says

"I don't know how to love Him."

A question I ask myself is how do I as an elderly white heterosexual man know and show that I love Jesus?

The word love can be used very loosely and can refer to widely different feelings and contexts.

Whom do I love and how do I show it?

I love my wife and my children. I love our cat, music, Leicester City Football Club, a good curry, leading and preaching in church, close friends, strong beer, growing plants, playing the quitar, reading etc. etc. etc.

Each of these loves is felt and expressed in different ways, intimacy, deep emotional commitment, respect, acceptance, dedication and service, admiration, communication, affection, forgiveness, empathy, sharing, loyalty, companionship and so on. Unlike the sentiments stated in many songs, love isn't only about feelings which sweep over us, it is also about decision making and priorities. We sometimes confuse liking and loving.

However, there is a true song entitled "Love is a Many Splendoured Thing" which in all its aspects it is indeed.

So, back to loving Jesus. How do we know and show we love Him?

We can see lots of ways love for Him is known and shown in the Gospels. For instance, the first disciples make an effort to seek Him out and stay with him, they know and feel His acceptance and companionship, Mary defers to him at the wedding in Cana, saying to the servants

"Do whatever He tells you."

Thomas shows loyalty and solidarity, the disciples and crowds show admiration, astonishment and appreciation. Levi invites Him to a feast and introduces him to his friends, Zaccheus nearly falls out of a tree and having spent time with Jesus offers to compensate generously any whom He has cheated. Mary anoints His feet extravagantly and dries them with her hair, Martha prepares food and hospitality, Mary sits at His feet and listens.

Maybe, above all, love is about being connected.

In the film "Frozen" a song has the lines:

"Please don't shut me out again, please don't slam the door. You don't have to keep your distance any more".

Jesus in His love makes the first move to us.

We love because He first loved us.

Peter was chosen by Jesus to be the rock on which the future church would be built. Jesus could have chosen James for his family relationship, Paul for his intellect, but He chose Peter for his love.

Peter replied to Jesus, "You know that I love you." Then Jesus responded with how to show that love in action.

"Feed and tend my sheep. Follow me"

I don't know how to love Him?
