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Editorial

Vocations and Holy Days

O n Thursday 22nd May we celebrated Fr. Roy's twentieth anniversary of priesting with a Eucharist at which Fr. Roy presided and preached, with a bunfight to follow. It was a suitably joyful occasion, giving opportunity for me and many others to show our appreciation for all Fr. Roy has given to our parish through the years – enriching our worship and offering care and support to many individuals.



favourable report at the end of my first training year, and whether I had more firmly grasped the ontological change involved in priestly vocation.

Ontological change is a fancy way of describing a change to one's core identity, and in the case of clergy is denoted by becoming reverend. Ironically, this idea of identity change is something I only properly understood through becoming a husband and then a father – moments which profoundly changed the way I understood and thought of myself. Now, twenty-six years on, I hugely appreciate the privilege of priesthood and with it the knowledge that

This time of the year is commonly a time for priestly anniversaries with ordinations traditionally taking place at Petertide – the period of the church year close to the Feast of St. Peter and St. Paul on 29th June.

Celebrating Fr. Roy led me to count how many years it is since my own priesting (twenty-six) and to think afresh about my journey into priesthood and what it means to be a priest. I vividly remember coming back from selection conference and waiting to receive news on whether I had been recommended training. As it turned for out. mv recommendation was conditional on а



I am and always will be a priest – whatever role I may be in and, presuming I live long enough, even after I properly retire and am no longer in role. At its heart, priesthood is a ministry of reconciliation, helping to bring people into relationship with our Saviour Jesus Christ, and God our creator.

Not wishing to take anything away from priestly vocation but it has further struck me that clergy are far from being unique in finding that their sense of identity is bound up in what they do. And, of course, most professions can be vocational if approached in the right way – that is using our gifts, talents and skills in service of others, making a positive difference to those around us and the world in which we live. As Christians we would add to this the service of God and perhaps rephrase 'making the world a better place' to working towards God's kingdom of justice, peace and love.

For many, the summer months are a time for a break from work and chance to spend time with our friends and families. I pray they may also be holy-days in which we find refreshment, so that we might be renewed in whatever several vocations we may have – as spouse, parent, carer, student, employee, or volunteer – recognising the inherent goodness and joy in giving ourselves to whatever God calls us to do.

Ringing World National Youth Contest 5th July 2025

The ringers at St. Alphege will be hosting nearly 200 young ringers across the day as they come and ring our beautiful bells (9:30 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.). In all, nearly 300





young people will be coming to the Birmingham area to take part in ringing competitions at Edgbaston, Erdington and St. Marv's, Moselev with the results being announced at St. Martin's in the Bull Ring. In between their competition slots they'll be visiting some of the finest rings of bells across the Midlands which includes our very special 12 bells. Only the competition ringers will be allowed into the tower but they, their family members and even the general public will be welcomed to have a go on the Maplestead mini-ring. The mini ring will be stationed to the left of the north porch, unless it's very poor weather when it will be inside at the West end. It should be a really fun day. So put Saturday 5th July into your calendar and come and listen to some hard working and dedicated young people ringing and may be even have a go on the mini-ring?

Thank You for Bell Sunday

Bell Sunday W hat a privilege for the band to be invited to join the Sung Eucharist on Sunday 18th May for Bell Sunday. Bell Sunday is a national celebration and falls on the closest Sunday to the feast day of St. Dunstan, the patron saint of bell ringers. It is a day for raising the visibility and awareness of bell ringing, strengthening relationships between ringers and the wider church community, highlighting the importance of the sound of bells in our surroundings. Some of the band attend alternate services or even services elsewhere so how lovely to come and meet so many of the congregation when we usually just slip upstairs, out of sight through the outside door in the corner, near the vestry.

We started the day with another visit to The Junction in the Oliver Bird Hall, they always give us such a lovely welcome. The ringers stood at the back as the service got underway and they were real sports as they joined in the actions of the songs. We took handbells with us and rang the bells in such a way as to mimic church bells, weaving in and out of each other to make the sound of changes. Fun and entertaining to watch, this isn't how





we would normally ring so there's always a few slip ups and giggles along the way. The older children then joined in and as you can imagine, they immediately got the hang of the patterns we follow. For the younger children we had taken the smallest of our handbells from a larger set for tune ringing. Even the youngest of them could hold a bell and give it a good jingle.

Then it was time to collect up the bells and dash off to the tower to ring for the morning Eucharist but not before suggesting that The Junction children listen out carefully as they'd hear us as they left their service. Robert had made many of the arrangements with the Rector and his team so, he corralled us all and off back down the stairs we went. Waiting patiently to process in once the choir had passed the internal door to the tower. A special occasion for the congregation to see us together and coming into church in such a visible way. This time we brought with us two of our largest handbells and our two model bells which were placed either side of the altar. A bell rope was hung from the pulpit. The peal board had been leant against the altar that morning, before the service started. A peal is continuous ringing without repeated changes and lasts over 3 hours. When peals are rung for very special occasions they are recorded on a peal board, a type of 'plaque'. It's taken a

while to organise but, we now have a new peal board recording both a peal and quarter peal rung to commemorate the millennium of the martyrdom of St. Alphege, Archbishop of Canterbury, which we marked in 2012/2013. It was appropriate for Robert to lead us into church as he had made all the arrangements for the peal board to be made, framed and collected.

The service was very special. The Collect was followed by a prayer for Bell Sunday



Incline your ears, O Lord, to our prayers, and grant that as the bells of your Church sound in this parish so the hearts of those who hear them may be awakened to worship you that the faith and devotion of Christian people may be increased to the greater glory of your Holy Name

Bell ringers Richard Harris and Linda Whitehead delivered the readings in between which the new peal board was blessed. Those who had taken part in this special ringing were invited to stand for a blessing and then there was a blessing for all of the bell ringers in which we dedicated our ringing to the glory of God. During his sermon Revd. Nick referenced the bell rope hanging from the pulpit and he gave us the thank you cards made for us by the children



at The Junction, after we had left them. The cards now proudly hang in the ringing room for our visiting ringers and all to see. What a fantastic morning!

Oh, and just another note to

add. The week after Bell Sunday, Sheila, the Church Warden, wrote to us to say that the sound of the bells before the Sunday service had called two non-churchgoers into the church. Such a joy to hear that our ringing really can help connect us to our community and thank you to Shiela for sharing this with us.

Philip in Philippi

 \boldsymbol{I} n May this year, Philip and I visited the ancient city of Philippi. So, it was particularly poignant on our return, that the readings on 25th May and 1st June were about St Paul's mission there.

Acts 16. 9-15 and Acts 16. 16-34.

Paul had a vision to go to Philippi and he set sail from Troas (in modern day Turkey) to Samothrace then to Neapolis and from there to Philippi. Our journey there was much easier. We were spending a week in Thessaloniki, Northern Greece and we made our way to Philippi in Eastern Macedonia by

There were two great turning points in the history of Philippi. The first, in 41 BC, in the aftermath of the assassination of Julius Caesar, was the biggest ever confrontation between Romans. The legions of Brutus and Cassius met those of Antony and Octavian. After twenty days Brutus and Cassius were defeated and committed suicide. Octavian (now Augustus) claimed Philippi, and renamed it Colonia Augusta Iulia Philippensis. He then settled his army veterans there.

The second major turning point was when St. Paul came to the city to preach and baptized



bus. It was a two hour journey to the port of Kavala (Neapolis as it was known in Acts) and then a local bus to the village of Philippi and from there a short walk to the ancient site. The Greek city called Crenedes was founded in 360-359 BC and was re-named Philippi in 356 BC by Philip II of Macedonia, (father of Alexander the Great). Just within the walls of the city, is an amphitheatre built by Philip II in 356 BC. It was partially restored in the 1950s for Philippi's summer festival, featuring ancient drama and music.



St. Paul came to the city to preach and baptized his first Christian convert, Lydia. (Acts 16 v 14).

There is not very much left of the Roman city which St. Paul would have known when he came in AD 49-50, but we did see the site of the prison where Paul and Silas were imprisoned



and were liberated by an earthquake. The prison was built under a shrine and is supported by props. A main road, the Via Egnatia, runs through the site with large paving stones and side passages linking it to the Forum, Library and Palestra. There are remains of three early Christian basilicas and sanctuaries dating from 3rd - 5th century AD, a Bishop's Palace and early Christian baths.

In AD 619, the city was partially destroyed in an earthquake, and subsequently its stones

were used as building material. Excavations were begun by the French in 1914, and in 2016 Philippi was inscribed in UNESCO's World Heritage List.

The site is well worth visiting and, most importantly, there are excellent refreshment facilities there. It was great, as unlike most ancient sites one visits these days, there were very few people there and we could wander almost anywhere.

Worship Notes July & August 2025

The months of July and August are full of feast days and celebrations! Here are a few 'highlights' of this season.

Thursday 3rd July – St. Thomas the Apostle

Most famously Thomas was the disciple who was unconvinced by reports of the Resurrection of Jesus, causing Jesus to show him the marks in his hands and feet and side. Thomas then proclaims the words that form the great climax to John's gospel by saying to Jesus, "My Lord and my God!"

Friday 11th July – St. Benedict of Nursia

Benedict was born in Italy, around the year 480. Later in life Benedict wrote his Rule for Monks. His Rule was so effective that it was shared and followed widely, becoming the model for all western monastic life.

Tuesday 15th July – St. Swithun

Swithun was Bishop of Winchester in the Ninth Century. He is most famously remembered for the onset of long summer storms apparently caused by the moving of his bones in the Tenth Century, but was also known for giving charitable gifts and for his simplicity of life.

Tuesday 22nd July – St. Mary Magdalene

All four gospels give Mary Magdalene a unique place among Jesus' followers. Along with other faithful women, she stayed beside the cross during the crucifixion and was the first disciple to discover the empty tomb on Easter morning. She experienced the first appearance of the risen Lord, who sent her to take the good news of the Resurrection to the other disciples.

Wednesday 6th August - The Transfiguration of our Lord

The story of the Transfiguration of Jesus shows that God's salvation is for all and Christ is that Saviour. The event also pre-figures the Resurrection, giving a foretaste of the life of glory.

Saturday 9th August - Mary Sumner

Mary Sumner was born in 1828. A mother of three children, Mary called a meeting in 1876 at which the Mothers' Union was founded, encouraging mothers in the bringing up of children in the Christian Faith. It grew steadily into an international movement which now operates in 84 countries across the world.

Saturday 30th August - John Bunyan

Born in 1628, John Bunyan was largely self-educated but he wrote Pilgrim's Progress, a text of spiritual genius which tells the story of the man Christian on his journey through life to God. History tells us little about John Bunyan but it is clear from his writings that the salvation of the soul was what mattered most to him. It is from his Pilgrim's Progress that the hymn 'To Be a Pilgrim' (or 'Who Would True Valour See?') is taken. News

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Pioneer Diary

Walking a Sacred Path

O n 19th May the Wellbeing Wednesday (WW) community celebrated its 4th birthday. To mark this occasion, 24 of us (that's two thirds of the community) went for afternoon tea at the Royal British Legion club on Union Road – the place that hosted us earlier this year when the Greville Arms was closed for refurbishment. The celebration afternoon tea was a lovely event, with good company and even better food. (*I recommend the RBL to you, and especially their afternoon tea. Pre-booking necessary. Suzette.*(3))

Love or hate the word, 'wellbeing' is still big in peoples' psyche today. For instance, did you know that there are men's wellbeing walks, entitled '*Men Walking and Talking*', happening every Tuesday at 7 p.m. from the gates to Brueton Park (New Road)? Plus, when a women's event started very recently on Wednesdays, same time, same place,100 women turned up on the very first evening.

As if this wasn't enough to capture our interest, I came across a quote recently (in the book *Walking a Sacred Path* by Lauren Artress) that I believe can help us get to grips with why 'wellbeing' should be on the agenda of any church community:

Walking the labyrinth clears the mind and gives insight into the spiritual journey. It urges action. It calms people in the throes of life transitions. It helps them see their lives in the context of a path, a pilgrimage.

They realise that **they are not human beings on a spiritual path but spiritual beings on a human path**.'

Read that again. This time, really emphasise the words in bold as you read. You might like to change 'they', to 'we'.

The Church has a history of helping people with their 'human path', right back as far as the Acts of the Apostles:

'In those days when the number of disciples was increasing, the Hellenistic Jews among them complained against the Hebraic Jews because their widows were being overlooked in the daily distribution of food'. The response was '³ Brothers and sisters, choose seven men from among you who are known to be full of the Spirit and wisdom. We will turn this responsibility over to them ⁴ and will give our attention to prayer and the ministry of the word.' Acts 6:1,3-4)

Through the centuries: 'It was in the Christian world that hospitals spread over almost like a popular phenomenon. By the middle of the 6th Century, many hospitals arose in Europe thanks to the support of churchmen, noblemen and kings.' 'In his monastic Rule, St. Benedict of Nursia (c. 480–547), placed the care of the sick 'above and before every other duty', suggesting to establish an infirmary (infirmitorium) for inmate and sick travellers in every monastery, repository of medical as well as all the written ancient and medieval knowledge. The charity and the care: the origin and the evolution of hospitals - ScienceDirect

Through to the 19th Century and beyond: '*The churches can legitimately lay claim to having initiated the entire education system within England and Wales. From 1808 onwards the churches founded schools, trained teachers and organised the daily curriculum of many*

millions of pupils.' Developments in Religious Education in England and Wales (Part 1): Church and State, the 1988 Education Reform Act, and Spirituality in Schools - The Gospel Coalition

SCAH – that is, Solihull Churches Action on Homelessness - *began 'in 1993 when 'cardboard cities' were at their height, campaigning soon developed into practical action and over the years initiatives such as assisted housing for the young, a rent deposit scheme and furniture restoration have been part of SCAH's work. In recent years SCAH has provided 'starter packs' ... as well as helping to alleviate general poverty.' https://www.scah.org.uk/*

When we meet people on their human path, at their point of need, we do this with no hidden agenda, but it can often lead to an opportunity to share with them what it means to be a spiritual being. This, I believe, makes the occasional offices of baptisms, weddings, and funerals a valued asset to the Anglican Church.

To go back to Wellbeing Wednesday. Through promoting Lent and Advent with the community – two seasons that are very important to me – and offering a chance for discussion, we now have the weekly meeting that is *Food4Thought*. In June (as I write) we know that we will be looking first at the word '*spiritual'*, and then the spiritual practice of '*the examen'*. The latter topic – asked for by the group (after they read my article in the parish magazine) – has prompted the former word as introduction. Food4Thought remains one of the highlights of my week, with lively discussion that often reminds me that we are all spiritual beings on a human path.

In conclusion, pray with me this prayer based on Philippians 1:6 - "*Being confident of this, that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus."*

Heavenly Father, guide me as I seek to grow spiritually. Help me to deepen my relationship with You and to follow Your teachings more closely. Grant me the strength to overcome spiritual obstacles and the discernment to recognize Your voice.

May my growth in faith reflect Your love and grace. Amen.

In February 2020, the General Synod of the Church of England set the Church an ambitious challenge: to reach net zero carbon across all parishes, cathedrals and diocesan and church-school premises by 2030. It recognised that the Church, as part of God's mission, is called to 'strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and to sustain and renew the life of the Earth' (wording taken from the Five Marks of Mission).

The Church of England has published its 'Routemap to Net Zero Carbon by 2030' (https://tinyurl.com/cofenetzero) which aims for a future where 'the buildings of the Church will be warm, bright and welcoming, powered by renewable energy and using low or zero carbon technologies for heat and light. Energy consumption for the Church as a whole will have fallen, on-site renewable energy generation will have increased, travel will be by low carbon means...' (Routemap, p.6).

This target will require both thought and action at all levels of church life, based on an understanding that the whole of creation has its beginning in God's generous love.

As a parish, we have made some important steps in our journey towards net zero. For example, St. Helen's Church has been using solar panels for a number of years, St. Alphege Church now has a low-energy lighting system, and St. Michael's Chapel has installed double-glazed windows.



However, there is still plenty of work to do, both across the wider Church and in our own parish. The P.C.C.'s Social & Environmental Justice Committee strives to help the parish 'to care for the created world and to seek sustainable ways of living, working and worshipping' (wording from the Committee's Terms of Reference).

As part of that remit, and on behalf of the Committee, I hope that you will find the Environment Days calendar a useful resource to aid your own journey towards net zero, and to help you to care for God's wonderful creation.

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Matters of Faith

God the Three-in-One

On the Sunday after Pentecost, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Holy Trinity, more commonly known as Trinity Sunday. On this day, we focus our worship particularly onto the life of the three persons of God - the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit - and we take time to explore our understanding of this central part of our faith. Of course, every act of Christian worship properly focuses on the Trinity, and our relationship to God the Three-in-One. This is especially true of our celebration of the Holy Eucharist, in which we are invited to enter more deeply into that relationship.

From the outset...

The opening words of the Eucharist declare our intention to offer our worship in the presence of God the Trinity. The priest says, '*In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit*', to which the people respond '*Amen*'. Additionally, we may make the sign of the cross as those words are spoken, thus outwardly acknowledging the presence of the three persons of the Trinity.

Words of praise...

A little later in the service, the Gloria is either spoken or sung. The first line echoes the words of the angels who appeared to the shepherds at the Nativity: '*Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.* 'The remainder of the Gloria addresses each person of the Trinity in turn. First, we praise and give thanks to God the Father; secondly, we ask Jesus (who is God the Son) to have mercy on us and to hear our prayer; finally, we acknowledge the relationship between the three persons of the Trinity: '...*you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father.'*

Declaring our faith...

After the sermon, we are invited to affirm our faith by saying together the words of the Creed. (On most occasions, we say the Nicene Creed, though the Apostles' Creed may also be used.) We begin by making a crucial statement: '*We believe in one God...'*. Although the Christian faith teaches that there are three persons of the Trinity, we understand them as a unity or whole who belong one to the other. We are stating that we do not believe in three Gods, but in one God who is a family of three entities.

Then as in the Gloria, each of the persons of the Trinity is acknowledged in turn, beginning with God the Father. The longest section of the Creed speaks of Jesus, the Son, and outlines both his earthly and heavenly existence. The final part describes the work of God the Holy Spirit, and the Spirit's role in the history of salvation.

A holy 'pecking-order'?

It would be easy for us to think that there is a hierarchy within the Trinity - e.g. that the Father is the most 'important' of the Three - especially as both the Gloria and the Creed open with references to God the Father. Also, many sacred works of art depicting the Trinity have tended to show the Father as the largest figure on the canvas (and the Spirit as the smallest!).

However, the Church's understanding is that there is equality between the three persons of the Trinity, and that they exist in loving relationship to one another. In that way, the Trinity is the origin of the mutual love that we, as God's children, are called to have for one another.
