BIBLE STORY (from My Big Story Bible by Tom Wright): Genesis 17,18,21

Abram was puzzled. God had promised that he and his wife would have lots of children. But surely God must know that they were far too old for that to happen! How could God's promise come true?

God wanted to help Abram understand that the promise really would come true. So, God decided to make a special agreement. The special agreement said that God would give Abram a great land for his children and grandchildren. Those grandchildren would have lots more children. Then so would they, and so would they, until there were so many children they would become a whole nation.

As part of his special agreement, God changed Abram's name to "Abraham", which means "father of many nations".

The years went by. Soon Abraham would be 100 years old, and his wife, Sarah, would be 90. But still they had no children. The thought of becoming a father at 100 made Abraham laugh. Then, one day, three mysterious visitors arrived at Abraham's tent. Abraham invited them to stay and share a meal, and while they were eating one of them said, "This time next year, Sarah will have a son." Now it was Sarah who laughed. But a year later, God's promise came true. Sarah gave birth to a son. They named him Isaac, which means "laughing one".

Bible Reading: Colossians 3.1-11

So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory. Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life.But now you must get rid of all such things—anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. In that renewal there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!

GOSPEL: Luke 12.13-21

Someone in the crowd said to him, 'Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me.' But he said to him, 'Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?' And he said to them, 'Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions.' Then he told them a parable: 'The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, "What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?" Then he said, "I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry." But God said to him, "You foo!! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?" So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich towards God.'
