Editorial

As I write this, early in October, out of the window I can see a large horse-chestnut tree. The leaves on this one tree have withered into a dull brown colour, the sky is overcast and it is raining. Autumn has returned. By the time you read this it will be November, the clocks will have returned to Greenwich Mean Time, the evenings will be getting longer and darker. Here in the northern hemisphere, November can feel as if the whole world is dying.

The Church's liturgy appears to reflect that natural cycle. Early in November the Church offers various service of remembrance for those who have died, beginning with All Saints' Day. On this day we honour the many faithful Christians who have followed the teaching of Jesus Christ during their earthly lives and who are now at rest. During the year a number of saints are recalled and paid tribute to by name. We know, however, that there are many more whose names and lives are long forgotten. It is these we give thanks for on All Saints' Day.

All Saints' is followed by All Souls' Day. This is a more reflective occasion. Our service is always held in the evening. We invite people who have been bereaved over the past couple of years or so, to join us in giving thanks for the lives of their loved ones who have died.

This service is organised in collaboration with The New Door. Following the death of a loved one, volunteers at The New Door make contact with the bereaved and offer a listening service. Many people have benefitted from this service which can give a much-needed opportunity to speak about friends and family members and to air deep feelings which have been held within.

In the second week of November the whole nation comes together to honour and remember the many men and women who gave their lives in the service of this nation during times of war. The Remembrance Day services particularly focus on the Two World Wars, but those who died in more recent conflicts are also remembered.

November, however, is not just about dying. The fourth Sunday in November is the last feast day of the liturgical year, the Feast of Christ the King. This is a relatively recent addition to the liturgical calendar. It was introduced in the 1920's during a time of growth of oppressive regimes, especially in Europe.

This feast was intended to highlight a different form of leadership shown to us by Jesus: a regime based on justice and truth guided by the twin values of love for God and love for neighbour. Directed by the Kingship of Jesus Christ, we will not be led astray by false ideologies. The liturgical year therefore ends, not with fireworks and *Auld Lang Syne*, but with the triumph of Jesus Christ over sin, oppression and death.

The Feast of Christ the King usually falls on the last Sunday in November, but this year November presents us with a fifth Sunday. So it is that the last Sunday in November 2025 is Advent Sunday, the first Sunday of the new liturgical year. So, after all our November thoughts around endings and loss, the month ends with new beginnings, new promises and new hope as we begin to prepare ourselves for the coming of our Lord and Saviour. The cycle begins afresh.

This November, pray for those who have died, pray for those who mourn, pray for those who walk beside the bereaved. Most of all, give thanks to God for the hope he gives us all in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.



Ringers Outing

S o, it's been such a busy year for us with so many other things to tell you about that we haven't yet mentioned that we had an outing to Leicestershire earlier in the year! It was another successful trip, thank you to Gillian. We went off in a little coach, first stop Kegworth. We started the day crammed into a small coffee shop sharing seats and our breakfasts before tackling the rather awkward ladder to the ringing room at St. Andrew's. The bells rang as though they were somewhat heavier than they actually are and, a tad quiet making them hard to strike accurately between each other. But, we were off to a good start! As we were leaving, Robin was calling us over to look at his grandfather's name on the war memorial, which was lovely to see.





We'd probably already eaten enough at this point though we were still ready for lunch at the Jolly Farmer. Quirky little place with a quaint and cosy atmosphere. The beer was good and we had free chips, tea and coffee! Before long, it was time to get to Shepshed. Now this was an interesting tower; firstly we had to tackle another ladder though at least this one had a few handles to help haul yourself through the trap door. We understand the tenor (the largest bell) has an unusually small wheel attached for its rope.

Next stop was Belton, a gorgeous little ring of six bells with a small ringing room with windows into the church, so whilst we couldn't all fit in together, we could all be seen when the next instruction came as to who was required to ring. This was a last-minute substitution as another tower had let us down. But, how kind that Val, who let us in and who had made the last minute arrangements for us, had baked and she had the kettle on ready too! What's not to love about chatting over tea, coffee and cakes while you wait?

This meant that it was rather awkward to get going each time we rang. Some of us needed help to get started and lagged behind until someone came to the rescue! As we were all crammed into the ringing room, a friendly hand was never far away! Lovely clear sounding bells. This tower had a rather fun plaque held up by a stone head!



The weather had been fine and by the time we got to Oaks in Charnwood it was getting quite sunny and warm. Gillian usually comes up trumps with the sunshine and this was timed well for the team photo, in such a beautiful setting. We loved these bells which were a little difficult to



strike evenly but they went well. So sad they don't any longer have their own regular band. Where we can, we do take a look around the churches and here were 6 lances from the Battle of Waterloo were a bit of a distraction just as we should have been getting back on the coach!

Finally, we were on our way to Whitwick. Goodness these bells were noisy as we waited on the stairs whilst others were ringing. There was nothing to be done, we simply all had to squash into the ringing room. The other side of the little wooden door all was well. To one side the tower had what was probably the clock weight cabinet running down one wall, much as a chimney breast might in your home. The treble, the smallest bell, numbered one and the second bell of the eight, were set back into the two alcoves that the cabinet created so when we rang the ringers of these bells couldn't see each other unless they peered behind a picture hanging on the wall between them, not ideal! What made this tower is that the kettle was on and tea and biscuits were once again well received!

Just up the road we called into the George and Dragon for dinner, with the most enormous portions, never mind fish and chips, anyone for whale and chips? A great day was had by all. We have several less experienced ringers in our band and it was notable how they coped with the unfamiliar bells, we're all certainly making progress and confidence levels were high. This had to have been the outing with the most tea and coffee stops ever!

And the social calendar continues. As I write we're about to have our annual dinner and this month (as you read) we have a mini outing to near Banbury. So, you'll be hearing from us again soon.

Worship Notes November 2025

November is the final month in the Church's year and is often designated as Kingdom Season. Although not a separate season, like Epiphany or Lent, it is the final part of 'Ordinary Time' and has a focus on the coming Kingdom of Jesus Christ.

November also brings us a Principal Feast Day, several Festivals and Commemorations and one National Event. The month begins with the Principal Feast of All Saints' Day. On this day we celebrate the lives of the myriad number of saints, that great cloud of witnesses, who are not separately honoured by name. Our celebration of this day will be at our morning services on 2nd November.

All Saints' Day is immediately followed by All Souls' Day, or the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed. For many this is a much more personal occasion. At our Evening service on 2nd of November we will recall the lives of family and friends who have died as well as those whose funerals have been held through the parish in recent years. There will be an opportunity for departed loved ones to be mentioned by name and then to lay a lighted candle in their memory.

The Second Sunday in November is a National Commemoration in thanksgiving and remembrance of those who died in war, especially in the two World Wars. Following the outdoor service and laying of wreaths around the War Memorial, the service continues in church. There will be a separate services in all churches, including at St. Catherine's Church in Catherine de Barnes.

The fourth Sunday in November is the Feast Day of Christ the King. This day makes a fitting end to the liturgical year as we celebrate the triumphant reign and true kingship of Jesus Christ. This Feast, added to the liturgical Calendar about one hundred years ago, is held on the Sunday before Advent.


This year, November has five Sundays. As the month ends, we begin the new Liturgical Year on the first Sunday of Advent. Then we begin to focus our worship on the coming of Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour.





St Michael

60th Anniversary

Over sixty years ago a number of people from the new area round Oak Cottage had a vision. For some while they had been holding Sunday Schools (as they were known then) in their various homes, which had proved very successful. It was in 1958 that a Sunday School was held in Sharmans Cross School, which started the link between church and school which existed until recently.

The first service for what was to be known as St. Michael's was held on Palm Sunday 1965 in Sharmans Cross School. This was with the blessing of the then Rector, Canon Harry Hartley, and the Eucharist was presided over by Revd. Brian Lamb. Interestingly it seemed to have required permission from the P.C.C. before Palm Crosses were able to be blessed

and distributed at the service.

So it was that on Sunday 28th September 2025 that St Michael's came together, not now at Sharmans Cross School, but at Oak Cottage School, to celebrate not only the foundation of St. Michael's Church, but to celebrate the festival of our patron saint, St. Michael. Sadly, we aren't the sort of numbers we enjoyed back in the sixties. However, we are still dedicated, still loyal, still praising God, and still celebrating the Eucharist, so some things haven't changed.



For this very special service we had our resident music group, and refreshments after the service. Wine was available, and we were delighted that Geraldine Burge had made a number of cakes to help the celebrations along. A number of friends also came to help us celebrate, so it was a joyous service. Susan and Jennifer had put together a display of St. Michael's over the

past sixty years which was available to peruse and reminisce over.

Sherwood had compiled a book showing the history of St. Michael's, mainly in pictures. All together there were many treasures to help us remember our short history and those who made it possible.

At the same time, we were able to celebrate that Fr. Simon and Sarah came to St. Michael's twenty years ago to the day, as Simon first celebrated the Eucharist on St. Michael's Day in 2005. To mark this occasion, we were able to present him

The old altar we were using was very heavy to move and now rather dated. The new furniture was hand crafted by a carpenter based in Worcester and designed to be modern, but with tradition. So, it came into play for the first time at this celebratory service.

Pioneer Diary

Prayer Quarter

very now and again I come across a quote that sticks with me. One of those happened year and years ago in the first church I attended (it was to later become the church I was confirmed in; and later still the church I was married in; and later still the church I was first employed in as a Church Army evangelist - but I digress). I had been putting Christian Aid envelopes through doors when, on the way home, I found a scrap piece of paper in the street with the following Abraham Lincoln quote on it:

"I have been driven many times upon my knees

by the overwhelming conviction that I had nowhere else to go."

I have never forgotten that quote, or how I stumbled across it at an opportune time in my life.

So why begin with this? Well, prayer is very much on my mind at the moment as, on 15th September 2025, a new prayer time called *Prayer Quarter* began at the Greville Arms on Cornyx Lane, Solihull. The idea for this time of prayer originally came out of wanting to pray for my husband, David, and all others who are sick and/or suffering in some way. Months later it began in recognition of the latter, plus it is increasingly clear that we are living in a world that desperately needs our prayers. So, how to begin.

In Luke 11, verse one, we read that one of the disciples says to Jesus - "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples." Clearly, this need to pray – and the accompanying desire to learn how to pray - is not just our own: the disciples asked for it, and I have met countless people over the years who have been worried about not 'getting it right'. In fact, I once met a lady in her 90's who was absolutely convinced that she was no longer able to pray, as she had been taught – and believed all her 90+ years - that prayer had to be on your knees. Prayer, in actual fact, and in whatever position we prefer, is a heartfelt dialogue between us and our Heavenly Father. I would dare to add that if we can remember this, then it is very hard to get it 'wrong'. All of that being said, however, in recognition that many who come along to *Prayer Quarter* are beginners at praying, it is useful to have a framework for our prayers, and so we have a teaching method in place. I'll come back to that in a moment.

As you read this, *Prayer Quarter* will run from 10.15 a.m. to 10.30 a.m. on the Monday mornings when *Food 4 Thought* is scheduled for later (at 10.45 a.m.).

So, back to that teaching method. You may have met it before. During *Prayer Quarter* we use our hands as a reminder of what to pray for. That is:

Our *thumb* reminds us to always begin by praising God. So far we have begun in this vein by listening to a psalm or a portion of a psalm in praise of God. We have been learning about Psalms and their history along the way. (I politely declined the request for me to sing the psalm one week!)

Next, our *index finger* reminds us of things to be thankful for, pointing things out for us and, we have found, often reminding us of things that we take for granted.

Our *middle finger* - usually the tallest of our fingers - reminds us to ask for forgiveness for things we have done or left undone; said or left unsaid. We need a little more help with that one.

Our *ring finger* then reminds us of relationships and how we are called to pray for others. We have been using the prayer listings in the Parish magazine amongst other things, plus praying for those we know who are going through a tough time.

Finally, our *little finger* reminds us that it is OK to pray for ourselves.

Now the 'Quarter' in *Prayer Quarter* refers to the amount of time that we are praying. However, three weeks in and we're already finding that the 15 mins of prayer time flies by, plus there is only so much we can fit into that time. We may choose to extend our prayer time. In which case the 'Quarter' will come to mean the place in which we reside when we pray.

So, to end, I want to take us back to Abraham Lincoln and prayer: Lincoln remained steadfast in his faith even when General Robert E. Lee led his army of 76,000 men into Pennsylvania. Lincoln explained to a general wounded at Gettysburg: "When everyone seemed panic-stricken...I went to my room...and got down on my knees before Almighty God and prayed...Soon a sweet comfort crept into my soul that God Almighty had taken the whole business into His own hands..."

Amen to that!

Parish Strategic Vision

am pleased to share that, following positive conversation with each district council, our Parochial Church Council has supported the principle of greater targeted investment aimed at securing growth. The vision is for a renewal of worship and ministry in each corner of our parish enabling us to missionally engage with those on the fringe of church with greater intention and effect. The strategy includes the revitalisation of St. Helen's, moving forward with the next phase of building work at St. Alphege (Project Turnaround), maximising the new opportunities presented by St. Michael's relocation to Oak Cottage Primary School, and continuing to build on the flourishing pioneer work in the former St. Francis district.

The most significant additional financial costs will be towards Project Turnaround Phase Two and a commitment to fund a new post of an ordained minister with proven ability in church planting and revitalisation that prioritises ministry to children, young people, and families. This would be full-time for 5 years and based at St. Helen's. The result will be that we spend our reserves more quickly but in ways that have real impact and by God's grace will leave a very positive legacy. We may count ourselves fortunate to have funds which enable us to move forward on all this with confidence but remain dependent on present and existing partnerships. Most importantly we need partnership with all our church members whose prayers and generous giving will be essential. We will also be working hand-in-hand with the central mission team at Church of England Birmingham (the diocese), working hard to develop missional partnerships with neighbouring CofE churches and parishes, and seeking grants and gifts from potential funders.

Having made this decision there is now much to do towards developing detailed costed plans. This will take time as it requires careful consultation and learning from good practice elsewhere. Please know it is our intention to be as transparent as possible and that we recognise the importance of ensuring that present congregational members continue to feel valued and supported.

In the meantime, we ask people to commit this to their prayers – that we would faithfully fulfil the Gospel imperative to 'proclaim the Good News afresh to this present generation.'

Church of England News November 2025

he Bishop of Kirkstall, Arun Arora, spoke at a gathering of UK Minority Ethnic clergy and ordinands in Methodist Central Hall in London on 1st October. The event was organised by the Church of England's Racial Justice Unit and attended by more than 150 people from across the country.

Bishop Arun said the Church of England's role was not only to "unashamedly and unapologetically" speak against racist violence and abuse aimed at minority communities but to help facilitate listening and conversation between opposing groups.

The conference also heard from Bishop Rosemarie Mallett, Bishop of Croydon, joint lead bishop for racial justice. Bishop Rosemarie spoke of the importance of Black History Month, which takes place each October, and of the opportunity of churches to mark this event. She said, "At every level, we are calling on the people of God, to see Christ in each other, and to live and work to build a kingdom of mercy, justice and peace, where all feel they belong."

The Revd. Guy Hewitt, Director of Racial Justice for the Church of England, spoke against the misuse of Christian symbols of 'faith, love, unity and justice' to promote division. And he urged the Church of England to 'embrace' St. George's Day next year and 'celebrate a positive patriotism' rooted in Gospel values and the love of God for all.

The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, presided at a Eucharist service marking the end of the conference. In his address he said, "Sisters and brothers, each one of us is known. Each one of us is beautifully and fearfully made. Each one of us bears the image of Christ, and we belong to each other. And therefore one of the ways in which we acknowledge God... is by acknowledging Christ in each other, and acknowledging the sacredness and beauty of every human life."

Matters of Faith

Footprints

he popular poem *Footprints* (sometimes called 'Footprints in the sand') has been claimed by several authors over the years, but the argument over its authorship pales into insignificance when one looks at the meaning of the words on the page.

In short, this is the story of a person reflecting on their life and seeing two sets of footprints in the sand – one belonging to them, and one belonging to God.

During the hard times in life when the person sees only one set of footprints, they question God asking, "Why did you leave me when I needed you most?"

To which God replies, "My precious child, I love you and I would never leave you. During your times of trial and suffering, when you see only one set of footprints in the sand, it was then that I carried you."

While the poem itself does not come directly from a Bible verse, it takes inspiration from multiple passages about God carrying His people through hard times. Here are some of those verses:

Psalm 55:22 – Cast your cares on the Lord and he will sustain you; he will never let the righteous be shaken.

God wants us to give our burdens to him, but often we continue to bear them ourselves even when we say we are trusting in him. Trust the same strength that sustains you to carry your cares also.

Deuteronomy 31: 6,8 – Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the Lord your God goes with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you -

The Lord himself goes before you and will be with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged.

We become content when we realise God's sufficiency for our needs.

Psalm 22: 9-11 -

Yet you brought me out of the womb;

you made me trust in you, even at my mother's breast.

10 From birth I was cast on you; from my mother's womb you have been my God.

11 Do not be far from me, for trouble is near and there is no one to help.

God's loving concern does not begin on the day we are born and conclude on the day we die. It reaches back to those days before we were born and reaches ahead along the unending path of eternity. Our only sure help comes from a God whose concern for us reaches beyond our earthly existence. How can anyone reject such love?

2 Corinthians 4:8-9 – 8 We are hard pressed on every side but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; 9 persecuted but not abandoned; struck down but not destroyed.

Paul reminds us that though we may think we are at the end of the rope, we are never at the end of hope.

Isaiah 41:10 – So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.

We need not fear because (1) God is with us, (2) God has established a relationship with us, and (3) God gives us assurance of his strength, help, and victory over sin and death.

Are you aware of all the ways God has helped you?


