The Advent Season of Light

he shortest day and longest night, 21st December, coincides this year with the Fourth (and final) Sunday of Advent. Advent means 'coming' and is traditionally a time of hopeful preparation as we await the coming of Jesus. At this darkest time of the year Advent is also a season of light – with the lighting of candles a prominent feature in many of our services including Christingle and most dramatically our Advent Carol Service. This service begins in darkness, before our hand-held candles are lit, and ends with every light in church shining to its full brightness and glory. Meanwhile our Bible readings, poems, and sacred music take us on a journey through God's oft-repeated promise to come amongst us, culminating in the angel's message to Joseph that Mary's unborn child would be named Jesus and save God's people from their sins.

It was good to be asked by a curious visitor at a recent interfaith gathering, why we light candles in church. Good because we often take such traditions for granted and the question caused me to reflect. The conversation was prompted by our votive candlestand so I began by explaining that lighting candles can be prayer – the lit votives a reminder both of God's presence amidst whatever darkness we may be facing, and that God continues to hear our prayers even after we have stopped speaking, just as the candle continues to burn long after we have left church to continue our day. I also spoke of Jesus the Light of the World (John 8.12) who illuminates our path and who came to banish the darkness of this world.

As we enter Advent, I am this year particularly aware of the darkness – both the darkness of selfishness and sin within our own hearts, and the darkness of injustice and cruelty in the world out there – expressed in ignorance and prejudice, greed and poverty, conflict and war.

Truth is, most of us experience darkness of one kind or another – whether that already mentioned, or it might be the various pains and griefs we struggle to bear – often deeply personal and frequently beyond our control. Whatever darkness we may presently be facing, without or within, we are invited to come into the warmth of Christ's light, the light of hope we will share through this Advent and Christmas season. To this end, we greatly look forward to welcoming many guests and visitors to our services across the parish (see details on pages 18 and 19) as well as to St. Alphege on any weekday between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. with the invitation to light a candle as silent prayer and symbol of hope.

I close with ancient words from the prophet Isaiah, a scripture we will hear within our Advent services. If you happen to be fan of Handel's Messiah this might also be a musical memory, helping us to keep these powerful words of promise in mind.

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined. For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders, and he is named Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. (Isaiah 9.2,6)

Soroptimists from Solihull ORANGE the World!

25th November marks the UN International Day of the Elimination of Violence against Women, and the start of 16 Days of Activism against Gender Violence which ends on 10th December (Human Rights Day). The colour orange represents a brighter future, free from violence against women and girls.

Members of Solihull and District Club will be joining Soroptimists across the world taking action and calling for the Elimination of Violence against Women. In Solihull Club members will be busy installing displays of orange flowers around the Borough, running a poster competition for secondary schools and, with Solihull Council, hosting an event to launch this years' activities.

These include a showing of the film "What's Love Got To Do With It" at The Core. A 1993 biographical drama telling the story of Tina Turner's life. This is a very moving film showing how she survives neglect and an abusive relationship to become a global superstar. It will be shown on Saturday 22nd November at 7 p.m. Tickets are £6 and available from The Core box office.

On 25th November the Mayor of Solihull, Councillor Annette Mackenzie will be at the gates of Malvern Park which will be covered with an eye-catching display of orange flowers. The flowers have been made by individuals and community groups across the Borough. Every flower made raises the awareness of the harm caused by domestic abuse. As Soroptimists we aim to challenge harmful behaviours and support survivors to rebuild their lives.





Displays can also be seen at The Core, Three Trees Community Centre, Chelmsley Wood and Hatchford Brook Family Hub. The art work from the school poster competition will also be on display in The Gallery at The Core from 25th November with judging taking place on 27th All the displays sign post people to the help and support available to them.



A Different Sort of Day Out

Reduce, Reuse and Recycle is a well-known mantra to help in the fight for survival of God's planet. The first two are fairly self-explanatory but when it comes to the third it has always seemed to be more complicated with the rules ever changing. So, what actually happens to our recyclable materials, here in Solihull? On 21st October, 8 parish members went to find out more by visiting Sherbourne Recycling Facility in Coventry.

We learned that traditionally residential recycling is handled by the contractor that collects the waste, whether that be the local authority or subcontractor. The system relies on the householder separating their recyclable materials correctly and is cost heavy on the councils dealing with the waste. Additionally, as reported in the media over the years, materials can be shipped abroad for recovery and/or processing and this may not always happen ethically.



Wanting to do things more sustainably and efficiently, the Sherbourne Material Recovery Facility (MRF) was conceived in 2016. The plan was so technologically advanced no British or even European company had the skills to provide the requisite machinery so a Canadian company was brought in. A total of 8 partner councils, including SMBC, came on board. After feasibility studies, financial modelling, planning permission and build, the first waste was accepted at the state-of-the-art plant in August 2023. Sherbourne MRF is now a global exemplar of what can be achieved and other facilities are now popping up worldwide. The councils invested a total of £65million, but over their 25-year contracts they should, all being well, recoup their investment and save money. Once materials are separated and recovered for processing, the profit from their sale is then shared between the 8 councils for use (we hope!) across the communities. Additionally, there is no need for separation of recyclable materials by residents.

Amazingly, the plant, which has the capacity to process 47.5 tonnes of waste every hour, has only 5 manual pickers. As the bulk of the work is carried out by 18 sorting robots, health and safety risks are reduced and recruitment issues avoided as unsurprisingly, not many people want to work with waste!

A tour of the plant showcased numerous conveyer belts whizzing through various stations where specific materials were removed: glass, metal, paper, cardboard, as well as hard and soft plastics. It was mesmerizing watching the robot arms pick materials out at speed and air pistons fire the waste into the correct hopper; soft plastics shot up and over, cardboard down etc. Our ear defenders were certainly required as the machinery and robots worked their magic.

A key element to the facility is that it operates sustainably. Forklift trucks are electric and plant power requirements are fulfilled by solar panels and the neighbouring *Energy from Waste* incinerator. Incidentally, any residue waste from the plant is also sent there, rather than to landfill. Importantly, the recovered materials are sold to UK based recycling processors and is transported by ultra-low emission compliant vehicles too.

So, what tips and hints did we learn? Unsurprisingly, contamination caused by residents is the main barrier to recycling materials...

- cans and tins, preferably not crushed are welcomed, but other metals such as frying pans, paint tins and metal gas cylinders should go to Bickenhill Waste and Recycling Centre.
- Intact, clean glass bottles and jars can be popped in. Wine bottles *can* have their lids left on. However, glassware and Pyrex should not be included. Basically, if it isn't single use glass it shouldn't be put in your recycling bin.
- Wet items especially cardboard isn't suitable nor is shredded paper; even if it is contained
 in paper carrier bags. However, pizza boxes that have just a smear of food residue or
 slightly soiled paper plates are welcomed.
- Plastic such as milk, drink or soup cartons should be rinsed clean with small lids left on.
 Likewise plastic take-away and food trays must be cleaned; unwashed food and drink
 containers cause contamination and have to be removed on entry to the plant.
- Soft plastic films should be separated from food containers, particularly if the tray is a
 different material. Both tray and film must be clean and dry before being put in the recycle
 bin. Most areas still can't recycle soft plastics via kerbside collection, so we are fortunate
 that our soft plastics no longer need to be taken to a supermarket for onward transmission.

It was however sad to see the items that people had put in the recycling that are clearly unsuitable – domestic and even car batteries have been discovered in wheelie bins. In fact, a major safety challenge the plant currently faces is disposable vapes being put in with recycling waste. A fire caused by the crushing of a vape battery resulted not only in the suspension of operations but also substantial repair costs to the plant.

So, although we no longer have to sort our recycling waste, we do still need to take responsibility for what we pop in that bin and what state it is in! The advice from Sherbourne staff "please read council advice carefully, only put in what is listed, ensuring it is *clean, dry and intact*. Thank you." Wood You Believe It?

Solihull care home residents team up with schoolchildren for DIY project

A care home in Solihull has joined forces with a local nursery and joined a nationwide campaign to save DIY skills.

Residents at Blossomfield Grange, on Worcester Way off Dog Kennel Lane in Shirley Heath, have been rolling up their sleeves and getting stuck into some hands-on DIY – all in the name of sharing skills with the next generation. As part of Care UK's 'Fixer Uppers' programme, residents worked with children from Mad Hatters Day Nursery, who got their creative juices flowing during the intergenerational activity. Together, they painted and decorated in vibrant colours bird boxes previously handcrafted by the residents. With the help of the home's maintenance manager, they then installed them in the garden and outdoor spaces, creating new areas for birds to enjoy.

Clifford Glanville said: "It was lovely to share my skills and knowledge with the children as we worked together to create and decorate the bird boxes. They loved being there while they were placed on the trees for the birds, ready for winter."

Jag Singh, General Manager at Blossomfield Grange, said: "Residents have honed their DIY skills over a lifetime, and the *Fixer Uppers* project has been a fantastic way for them to connect with young children and share practical knowledge in a meaningful way. It was wonderful to see everyone fully engaged and residents swapping stories, learning from one another and genuinely enjoying the process. We'd like to thank Mad Hatters Nursery for coming to the home to take part in the decorating activity. It was a brilliant afternoon and we look forward to many more visits in the future."

Launched to celebrate International Repair Day, the initiative aims to revive traditional repair skills – such as fixing furniture, mending clothes and tackling small maintenance jobs – and champion the invaluable knowledge older generations can pass on while promoting sustainability.

The bird box crafting session was overseen by Blossomfield Grange's dedicated sustainability champion as part of Care UK's bid to embed environmentally conscious practices across all homes. Sustainability champions work closely with the Care UK ESG advisory committee to identify opportunities for greener ways of working, from reducing waste to encouraging biodiversity in care home gardens.

Eradication of Polio

P hil Godfrey gave a short talk on 26th October at the St. Alphege Church 10.30 a.m. Service. He explained that Rotary International, working together with the World Health Organisation, and the Bill Gates Foundation, have been working towards the eradication of polio throughout the world. World Polio Day is the 24th October, which was the birthday of Jonas Salk. Jonas Salk (1914 – 1995) developed the first safe and effective vaccine for polio, and gave it to the world, without making money from his vaccine.

The Bill Gates Foundation have been assisting this cause, by matching every pound raised by Rotary International with a donation of £2; the current three-year commitment is £450 million.

Poliomyelitis, popularly known as polio, is a highly infectious disease that mainly affects nerves in the spinal cord and brain stem. Most people infected with the virus don't show any symptoms, but a small number become paralyzed. Polio primarily targets children under the age of five. Polio was endemic in 125 countries in 1988; that is down to two now. Wild polio only remains endemic in Afghanistan, where there are 4 cases, and in Pakistan, where there are 29 cases. The global effort to eradicate polio has prevented an estimated 20 million cases of paralysis.

However, because it spreads so easily, one or two cases can quickly multiply. In our world of global travel, an infected person can carry the disease to the other side of the world even if they are not sick themselves. This emphasises how important widespread vaccination is.

Phil was surprised and shocked that most people he spoke to afterwards, said "I though polio had been eradicated" !! Sadly, this is not yet true and efforts cannot be relaxed to ensure that vaccination programmes continue uninterrupted.

Where at least 280,000 homeless people (up to 10,000 of them living on the streets) have no shoes or shoes that are falling to pieces. Then realise that we're actually talking about the UK.



This is despite the fact that we live in a country where millions of pairs of footwear that are still fit for purpose are sent to landfill each week! This footwear can be recycled, repurposed, and used to combat footwear poverty. Men, women, and children benefit directly from



donated footwear, enabling them to attend school, start a new job, and enhance their mental well-being by engaging in outdoor leisure activities.

Solihull Rotary has now succeeded in collecting some 550 black plastic sacks of shoes (all types and sizes) from the people of Solihull Club President, Phil Godfrey visited Hasluck's Green School recently, and a little army of helpers carried a huge pile of bags and boxes to the Car Park, which "filled" his car, no room for passengers!!





School children are often a great source of footwear for such charities as they grow out of their shoes quicker than they can wear them out. They are also one of the key groups in society that have a keen desire to help others.

Worship Notes for December

The Advent season is a journey from darkness to the light of the Christ-coming. And it is interesting that two of the servants of God who are celebrated during Advent bring us into contact with the theme of light.

St. Lucy is celebrated on 13th December. Tradition has it that Lucy, as a young Christian, gave away her goods to the poor and was betrayed to the authorities by her angry husband-to-be, who felt that the goods should have become his property. Lucy was put to death for her faith in the year 304. Lucy's name in Latin means Light and, as her feast-day falls in December, she became associated with the one true Light who was coming as the redeemer of the world, the Light that would lighten the nations, the Light that would banish darkness and let the eyes of all behold Truth incarnate.

The following day, 14th December, is the commemoration of Catherine de Hueck Doherty (1896-1985). She was born in Russia but came to Canada as a refugee, where she worked for a while as a lecturer. However, she felt God's call to forsake security and work among the very poor. Catherine became part of a Christian community called 'Madonna House', where she composed the following rule: 'Little, be always little, simple, poor, childlike... Go into the marketplace and stay with Me. Pray, fast, pray always, fast. Be hidden, be a light to your neighbour's feet.'

This poem speaks of darkness as the place where everything is held and encompassed. But it is not without hope: all life begins in the darkness of the womb. This is true for the Christ-child, too. He comes from darkness and enters the world's darkness as the Light for all people.

Darkness, your grand circle engulfs all the small bright circles of the world. None can withstand you: meteors trailing their lights through space, this slim candle on a shelf.

All selves belong to you, began in you. You place a hand on my shoulder, shift hand to wrist, feel my pulse. Your gentleness moves me to belief: in darkness.

Expressions of interest would help with more detailed plans.



A nother year has almost passed and we find ourselves reflecting on our Christmas Fayre and looking forward to all our Christmas activities. As usual the Christmas Fayre was held on the last Saturday of November. This is always an enjoyable but quite demanding event and we thank all those who have organised, manned stalls, distributed fliers and helped in all sorts of ways and, above all, we thank all those who turned up and supported. The proceeds this year will be shared between Troop Aid, which is Solihull based and provides basic needs to casualties returning from active service, and SCAH (Solihull Churches Action on Homelessness).

Looking forward to Christmas, our Community Carol Service will be held at 4.00 p.m. on Sunday 7th December. This event is always well attended by our neighbours and is a wonderful opportunity to share with them the good news of Christmas. We will then have our Church Carol Service on Sunday 21st December at 10.00 a.m.

Looking back over the last couple of months we were very privileged to welcome Chris and Denise Arthey to speak at our morning service on 19th October. Chris and Denise suffered a head on collision with a speeding car whilst riding their motorbike in Texas in 2008. They both suffered extensive life-threatening injuries with Chris spending several days in a coma. They both finished up having to have their left legs amputated and have prosthetic limbs fitted.

Rehabilitation took a long time and was very difficult but they came through and now



spend a good amount of time sharing their experiences and telling how their faith in God brought them through the difficult times. Their experiences are all shared in their book, Highway 35.

We continue to pray for and support Dr. Nicci Maxwell. Nicci has had a few weeks back in the UK, where she has had a heavy programme of speaking engagements concerning her work as a Paediatric Doctor in Africa. By the time this is published she will be back in Juba, South Sudan. The needs there are very great and the political situation is very unstable. Before taking up her current post, she worked at Potter's Village in Uganda. As a church we have contributed in various ways to Potter's Village hospital. The latest major requirement was for a new SUV used to carry patients and staff through the rough terrains Uganda. The old SUV was past its sell by date and a replacement was essential. We were pleased to have it announced in church that, thanks to donations from ourselves, the Rotary Club and many others, they had now purchased the new vehicle.

Earlier in the year we were saddened to hear that the Montessori School, which has met in St Helen's for many years, was closing down. This was a sad loss of a close friendship and also a substantial dent in our finances. However, we are now very pleased to be welcoming a new Montessori Ladybird School which will commence in January 2026. In preparation we

have redecorated the Youth Hall and undertaken a number of safety measures to accommodate their requirements. We look forward to a long and happy relationship with the new school.

Just after Christmas last year our Chapel boiler broke down. This is 30 years old, and we have been talking about replacing it for some time. However, the Church of England is now seeking to discourage replacement of fossil fuel burning boilers and, as a result, we had to apply for a faculty to replace it. As the requirements for heating in the Chapel are generally short term and of a non-continuous nature and there were not really any feasible alternatives, we have now after several months managed to secure the required faculty and will be replacing the boiler in the New Year. We did actually manage a repair of the old boiler after several very cold weeks but, bearing in mind the age and inefficiency of the old boiler, it seemed prudent to continue with the replacement. We are very thankful that we have received a very kind donation to cover the cost.

We continue to provide lunches for some of the elderly in our area on most Wednesdays. This is a very much appreciated service and we are very thankful to all our cooks, helpers and drivers for their dedicated service and to Anne Noble for her organisation of the whole service. However, we continue to struggle to provide enough drivers, cooks and helpers to ensure that the work can be carried out without overburdening our volunteers. If you think you can help in any of these areas or if you know someone who you think would appreciate the service, please let Anne know.

"God with Us"

"How are your PJ's?"

f I hope that's not too personal a note to begin with! \odot

Christian tradition has it that Advent always begins on the nearest Sunday to St. Andrew's Day (30th November). For some reason I have always remembered that fact. However, I have been less clear in the past about the order of the Advent themes. So, one year, I came up with – "I hope my PJs are lovely!" It's the way my mind works! Let me explain:

The main themes for the four Sundays in Advent are, alphabetically, Hope, Joy, Love, and Peace, each representing a significant aspect of the Christian faith during the season of preparation for Christmas. The order in which they occur over the Sundays of Advent is Hope, Peace, Joy, Love. Hence "I Hope my PJs are Lovely!" (You're welcome! (3))

So, as Advent begins, each of us are encouraged to think just how will I approach each of these themes in my preparations? How *are* your PJs?

Hope

There's a saying in Sheffield that says, "You can live in Hope and die in Hathersage!" (With apologies to those among you who are not as familiar with Derbyshire villages as us South Yorkshire folk are!)

Just recently at Food4Thought (as I write) we looked at the word 'lament', and we found, amongst other things, that true lament is an action, always leading us to hope. We see this in the psalms and in Jeremiah's lamentations: there is a turn in the language from despair to hope. E.g. "I remember my affliction and my wandering, the bitterness and the gall. I well remember them, and my soul is downcast within me. Yet this I call to mind and therefore I have hope: because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness." (Lam 3:19-23)

When it really comes down to it, what do **we** put our hope in? The first week of Advent is a good time to reflect on this.

Peace

While working as a Nursery Nurse there was a book that we read a lot. That book was entitled, "Five Minutes Peace". You may have heard of it? In the story, Mrs. Large, the mum of the Large family, is looking for just five minutes peace away from her busy life. This is often what we think of when we imagine peace. A haven. A peaceful place or situation. Away from it all.

However, Jesus tells us otherwise: "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." (John 14:27) This verse emphasizes the peace that Jesus offers, which is different from worldly peace. I often picture this as a view on a heart monitor. That is, we see a wavy line with all

the ups and downs of life but, cutting right through the middle of this wavy pattern runs a straight line, unchanging. That is Jesus' peace.

We need to take the time to tap into this peace. The second week of advent, as the pace begins to gather towards Christmas, is a good time to practice this in whatever way helps you.

Joy

In the third week of Advent, we celebrate *Gaudete* – or "rejoice!" – Sunday.

When we look at Joy, we need to ask ourselves if we do in fact know the difference between joy and happiness. Did we even know that there is a difference?

The difference, put very simply, is that while we choose joy, happiness is what we feel when circumstances around us fall the way we want or expect them to. (Hence, unhappiness can happen when the reverse happens.)

But what do we mean by choosing joy? Well, Biblical joy is not just a feeling but a practice. Joy is also a fruit of the Holy Spirit. We can ask to develop that fruit in our lives.

Overcoming Isolation Together

On 3 April, His Majesty King Charles III unveiled MAF's latest addition to its fleet The new Cessna 208 Caravan will serve the people of Papua New Guinea (PNG)

The King revealed the new aircraft to an excited audience at our special 80th anniversary event at RAF Northolt, West London – the Royal Air Force's oldest UK air base. Thanks to the incredible generosity of a charitable trust, MAF's global fleet now comprises 118 aircraft. This new plane will fly to and from the remotest communities in PNG, where our largest programme has been operating since 1951.

The momentous day marked a double celebration as this year is also the 50th anniversary of PNG's independence.

MAF UK Chief Executive Donovan Palmer invited the King to press a big red button, which revealed the shiny, new Caravan as the hangar door lifted behind him. Among the crowd were donors, dignitaries, supporters and staff, including several PNG nationals who were introduced to the King.

MAF Pilot Joseph Tua (Pictured) has worked in PNG since 2019. He will fly the new plane in the service of his people. Proudly wearing his country's ceremonial face paint, Joseph was particularly excited to meet the King – a fellow pilot who'd learnt to fly many decades ago with the Royal Air Force. 'To be invited to the UK for the commissioning ceremony of our newest aircraft and to meet the King is insane!' said Joseph. 'MAF carries everything from patients to tonnes of coffee, sweet potatoes, peanuts and oranges. This new aircraft will help us do a lot more. 'I never dreamed this amazing thing could happen to me. To be a part of this ceremony means everything. I am eternally grateful.'

Fellow Papua New Guinean Serah Michael (Below) – MAF PNG's Flight Operations Supervisor – is the main contact for emergency flights. It was her first visit to the UK. 'I am super excited!' said Sarah. 'I never thought i would ever visit the UK. I am proud to be part of this great international organisation bringing help, hope and healing. MAF is truly a lifeline to rural communities in my country. 'I'm just amazed and excited to meet the King. I'm honoured to be at this ceremony – it's the experience of a lifetime.'

Project Turnaround Update

Project Turnaround aims to support our parish mission to the community by making our buildings more welcoming, hospitable, comfortable and flexible. Phase 1, to renew the lighting in St. Alphege Church, was completed last year. Plans for Project Turnaround Phase 2, to undertake a comprehensive liturgical reordering of St. Alphege Church, were shared widely across the Parish last Autumn and in Parish News (June and October 2024).

Since then, the P.C.C. has responded to valuable feedback from everyone, in particular the Diocesan and Local Authorities and the various amenity societies, to tweak the scheme to be broadly acceptable.

One important change is to keep the pulpit at its current height and make it moveable by modifying the Victorian supporting frame under the pulpit to accommodate an hydraulic wheel system. By pumping the hydraulics, the whole pulpit can be raised on the wheels and located wherever needed.

Whilst generally supportive of the overall reordering scheme, the P.C.C. was asked by the Diocesan Authority to consider whether a more appropriate location for the new toilets existed within the present church to avoid building an external addition. Revised plans to locate the new toilets in the West corner of the North aisle and relocate the Children's Corner to the current position of the bookstall in the middle of the south aisle have been submitted. It is hoped that these proposals will now get approval. The revised plans are available to download from the Parish website.

When approved the P.C.C. will embark on fundraising whilst working up detailed designs to tender the works. The best guess is that, subject to approval and funding, the works could be undertaken after Easter in 2027.

Church of England News

A New Archbishop of Canterbury

You may have seen that His Majesty The King approved the nomination of the Bishop of London, the Rt. Revd. and Rt. Hon. Dame Sarah Mullally, as the next Archbishop of Canterbury. Bishop Sarah will be the first woman to hold the office and will be installed in a service at Canterbury Cathedral in March 2026.

Sarah Mullally has been the Bishop of London since 2018, the first woman appointed to that role, and before that was Bishop of Crediton in the Diocese of Exeter. Prior to her ordination in 2001, she was the Government's Chief Nursing Officer for England – the youngest person ever to be appointed to that role at the age of 37 – having previously specialised as a cancer nurse. She described nursing as "an opportunity to reflect the love of God".

The most senior bishop in the Church of England, the Archbishop of Canterbury's ministry combines many roles including serving as the Diocesan Bishop of the Diocese of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, as well as *primus inter pares* — or first among equals — of the Primates of the global Anglican Communion, which consists of around 85 million people, across 165 countries. In the House of Lords, the Archbishop of Canterbury is one of 26 bishops who comprise the Lords Spiritual.

Bishop Sarah said: "As I respond to the call of Christ to this new ministry, I do so in the same spirit of service to God and to others that has motivated me since I first came to faith as a teenager. At every stage of that journey, through my nursing career and Christian ministry, I have learned to listen deeply – to people and to God's gentle prompting – to seek to bring people together to find hope and healing. I want, very simply, to encourage the Church to continue to grow in confidence in the Gospel, to speak of the love that we find in Jesus Christ and for it to shape our actions. And I look forward to sharing this journey of faith with the millions of people serving God and their communities in parishes all over the country and across the global Anglican Communion. I know this is a huge responsibility but I approach it with a sense of peace and trust in God to carry me as He always has."

The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, said: "I'm delighted that Bishop Sarah Mullally has been appointed as the 106th Archbishop of Canterbury and the very first female in the role. She is a person of huge courage, wisdom, integrity, and experience. In the many challenges the Church of England faces at the moment, we need the kind, godly and stable leadership Bishop Sarah will bring. It will be my great pleasure to serve alongside her, and I hope that together we can continue the work of helping the Church of England be simpler, humbler and bolder in its proclamation of the good news of Jesus Christ and in our service to the nation."

Matters of Faith

Remembrance Sunday draws one of the largest attendances in the Church's year, reflecting its vital significance. There are three principal reasons which make it so.

- First, the need to remember and honour the sacrifices made on our behalf.
- Second, because we cannot afford to fail in our recommitment to work together towards a more just world in which all can flourish, and all may live in peace.
- Third, because this day genuinely belongs to us all, regardless of our background, and therefore has unrivalled power to bring our diverse community together.
 Something of supreme importance in this increasingly polarised world.

These truths are symbolised in various ways today.

- In the popular return of the community-knitted poppies adorning the outside of the church of various designs, including many red (remembering the huge sacrifices made in times of war), some purple (remembering the contribution of service animals), and some white (with a focus on peace and non-violence).
- In the 56 flags proudly carried by cadets from the Military Training College representing the nations of The Commonwealth who fought together alongside the British armed forces in both world wars.
- In the laying of wreaths from every corner of our town and borough.
- In outdoor and indoor services which draw together members of HM armed forces, veterans, and civilians, with contributions and participation from old and young alike each playing their part to the very best of their ability.

There is undoubtedly an irony in the fact that some of the darkest days in our shared history should provoke some of the most remarkable and noble acts of courage and self-sacrifice. It seems always to have been thus. Perhaps such moments of brightness may give us courage to face the darkness we see in the world past and present and, if we are honest, deep within ourselves.

If, through this service, we are able to do this - to allow ourselves to be moved by words, music, and symbolic action - we may yet be surprised by grace, that is through an encounter with the Living God. The God who entered His own created world in all its brokenness and pain, in order to heal, forgive, transform, and raise us up into His presence and His light.

That, indeed, is my prayer.





